

# Huntsville, Alabama Confederate Postal History

This exhibit presents Huntsville, Alabama Confederate Postal History during the Civil War.

Most Huntsville Confederate covers are found postmarked in 1861 or early 1862, and show either a handstamp paid or due marking. Huntsville was a strategic military target due to the presence of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad maintenance shops. Huntsville was captured by Union troops on 11 April 1862, and changed hands repeatedly during the remainder of the war.

Huntsville covers with Confederate postage stamps are scarcer than handstamp paid covers.

Huntsville used only one circle date stamp to postmark throughout the war, so by the end of the war, it can be difficult to read the postmark month, day and year.



The exhibit shows i) Confederate usage of US postage between 4 February and 1 June 1861, followed by ii) handstamp paid, iii) handstamp dues, and iv) Confederate postage stamps.

Key dates relative to mail handling by the US Post Office and the Confederate Post Office is provided in the following table:

Key Dates		
11 January 1861	Alabama seceded from the Union	24 days as independent state
4 February 1861	Alabama admitted to the Confederacy	4 months and 20 days
1 June 1861	Confederate Postal Service started	

Handstamp paid and dues type designations are taken from the **Confederate States of America Catalog and Handbook of Stamps and Postal History (2012)**. The catalog records five 5¢ handstamp paid markings; six 10¢ handstamp paid markings, and 3 handstamp due markings...

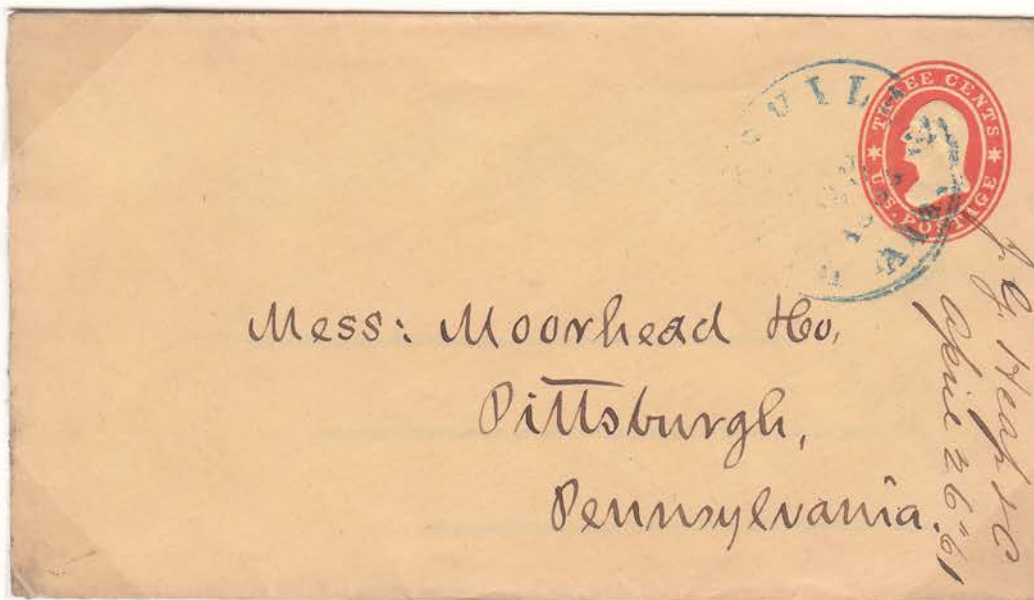

Dr. Wyck was the Regimental Surgeon serving under General Nathan Bedford Forrest.

Dr. Van Wyck was killed in action on 30 November 1861 while riding next to General Forrest on a reconnaissance and foraging mission to the Ohio River

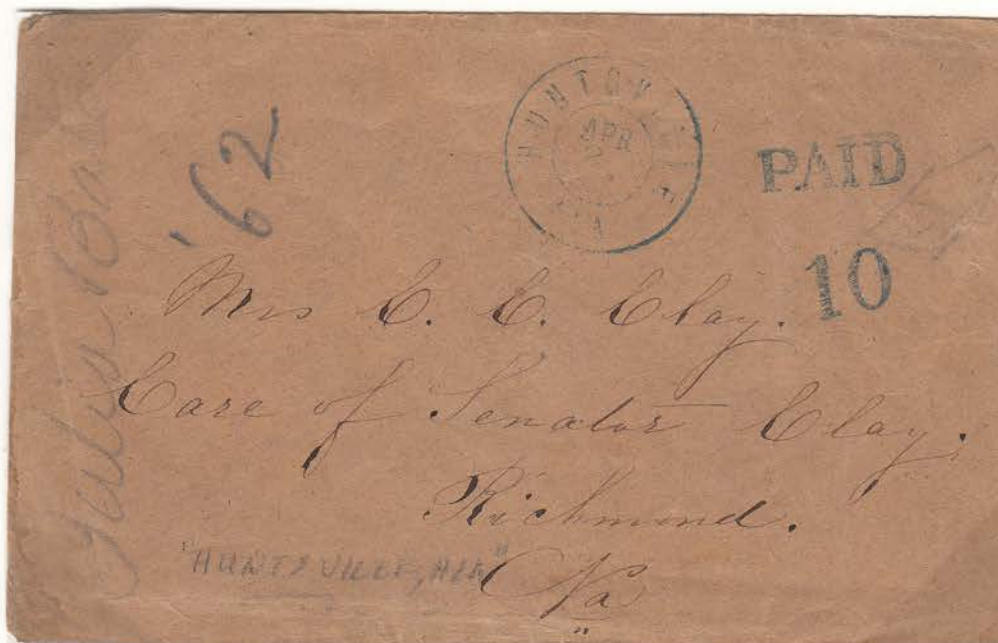

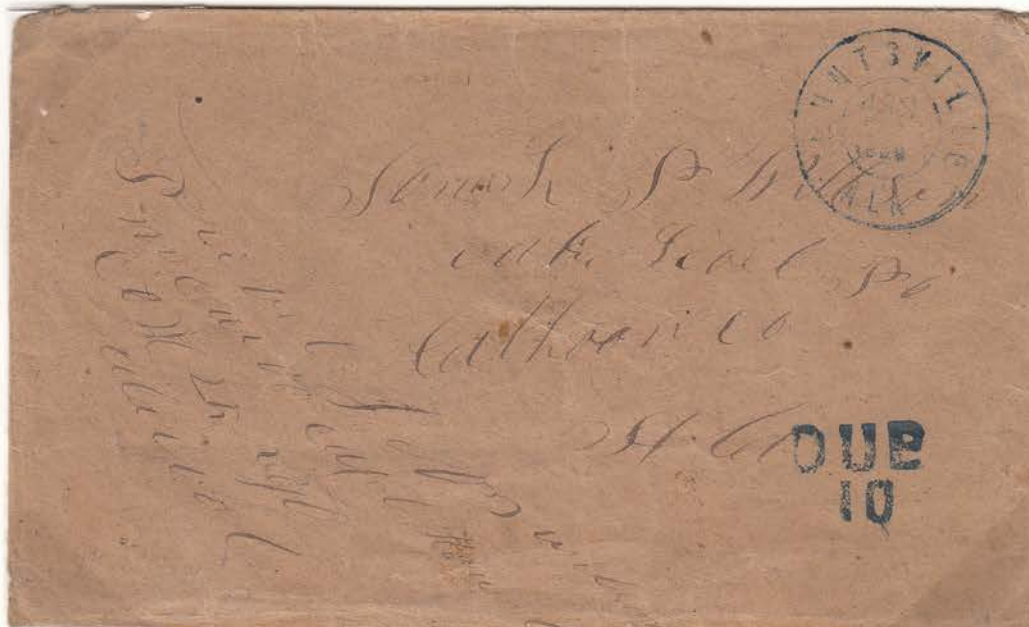

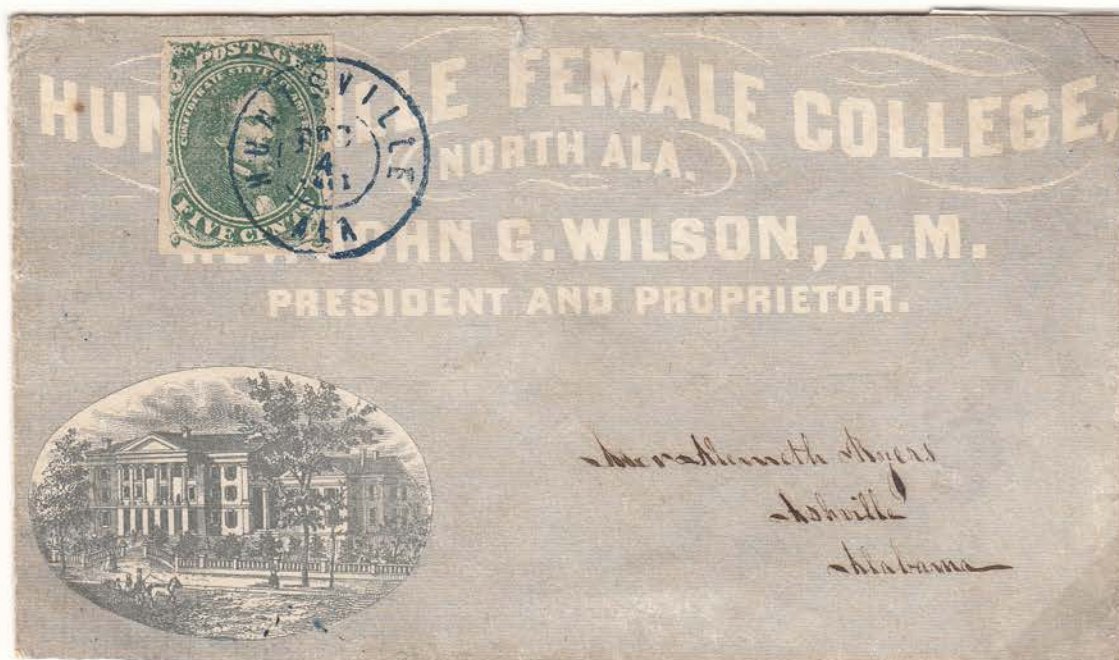
