NEPAL CALLING

Stamps the Telegraph System, 1917 to 1930



The telecommunication system of Nepal was born in 1917 when a telephone line connecting the capitol, Kathmandu, via an intermediate station, Chisapani, with the border town of Birgani was completed. Based on the British model, its governance was vested in the Post Office department. At the border town of Birgani a telephone connection with the cross-border town of Raxaul, India provided an access point to the world via the Indian telegraph system. A sub-station Amlekgani, located between Chisapani and Birgani, was added in

1927 when the railway line was completed between Raxaul and Amlekganj. This hybrid system that combined telephone and telegraphic communications is termed a "Tel-Tel" system.

In 1917, the remainder of the classic design postage stamps that had been stored at the Treasury in 1907 were re-purposed for use in paying the new Tel-Tel fees. When the stored stamps were exhausted, additional printings were ordered. Although the stamps printed between 1917 and 1930 were intended for the Tel-Tel service, they were also valid for postage within Nepal.

The classic design issue stamps were printed by typography using clichés locked into print formes until a one anna plate-printed stamp was issued in 1928. Many of the clichés had seen use since 1881 and were generally heavily worn. The settings often included missing, inverted or transferred clichés.

This exhibit includes the distinctive cancels followed by a review of the stamps by denomination.

Postal Cancels

Some few telegraphic period stamps bear postal cancels, most dated between 1928 and 1930. The scant information available indicates that the devices may have been transferred from post office control to use in the the telegraph offices in at least Chisapani and Kathmandu.

Stored Sheet, Setting 5

A very few sheets from setting 5, at press between 1906 and early 1907, were stored in the Treasury when the classic issues were replaced in late 1907. The items shown below, from the stored stock, were released in 1917 for telegraphic use. **These are the proving pieces**.

Setting 6, 1917

A short print run of the one-half anna in orange-vermilion rather than black was printed from a new setting in 1917. The tête-bêche items shown are two of the four known unused.

One-Half Anna Orange Yellow Shade setting 6

The one-half anna printed in the so-cataloged "lemon" shade, or more accurately, orange-yellow, is known only in four used singles and one cover.








This setting was the first used for the black printings during the telegraphic period.


















Setting 14, with only 7 rows instead of 8, was the last setting used to print the one-half anna stamps. The first state shows impression from spacers where clichés were removed at foot. Not known used.


Setting 14 contained seven rows instead of eight. The second state, after the blank spaces at foot had been trimmed away, show damage to the base of position G2.


The first state of setting 27, at press only during the 1903 to 1907 period, has no "gash flaw" in position B2. The sheet below is a remaindered sheet used telegraphically after 1917.

Setting 27, Second State, 1917-1928

The earliest prints from the second state, such as this sheet, are the first to show a wide gash flaw in frame at top left of position B2.





The one anna printed in emerald shade of the four annas stamps are from the earliest printings of the period. The prints in green are slightly later. Neither are not known unused,

Plate II, 1928-1930

Plate II, in use 1928 to 1930, was not a form of individual clichés as previous but rather a true plate of identical subjects of a new design. Note the "teardrop" corner ornaments.





Pin-perforated plate II stamps are not known used.




Shades

The two annas stamps printed during the 1917 to 1930 period exist in an almost infinite array of shades. Hellrigl attempted to reduce the named shades to 18.



Stored Sheet, Setting 20, 1905-1906


Remainder sheets from the 1905-1906 printings of setting 20 that had been stored in the Treasury were used telegraphically after 1917.

Setting 23 marks the first appearance of the progressive flaw, dent at bottom left, on the cliché in position B7. The damage likely occurred when the cliché was inserted into the forme inverted.

Pale Blue Two Annas Error of Color Setting 23

This block of the two annas in the pale blue shade of the one anna stamps rather than the normal range of purple shades was considered by Dr. Singer to be an error of color.

Setting 24, 1919-1920

Setting 24 is the first two annas setting with the cliché in position B6 inverted.

Setting 25 is identical to setting 24 except the cliché in position C2 is now inverted.

This setting, with eight inverted clichés, contains the greatest number of inverted clichés of any in setting used in the period.









Settings 11 and 12, 1917-1930

Sheets of the four annas from setting 11, first state, that had been stored in the Nepal Treasury were issued for telegraphic use in 1917. New printings were then made from later states of setting 11 and 12 between 1917 and 1930.

Setting 12 produced one of the great errors of Nepal philately as shown below and in sheet form on a following page. A single cliché of the one anna was inserted in position A8 (the top right corner position). Fewer than 60 examples exist.

Shades and Impressions

The four annas shades are not as varied as those found with the two annas stamps. Clarity of impression varies from mostly clear to a solid block of color.


















