GRANT FOR ERECTING LANCASTER INTO A BOROUGH.

GRANT BY KING GEORGE II., TO JAMES HAMILTON.

GEORGE THE SECOND, by the grace of God, of Great Britain, France and Ireland, King, defender of the faith. To all to whom these presents shall come,

Greeting: Whereas, our loving subject, James Hamilton, of the City of Philadelphia, in the province of Pennsylvania, Esqr., owner of a tract of Land, whereon the Town of Lancaster, in the same province, is erected, hath, on the behalf of the inhabitants of the said Town represented unto our trusty and well-beloved Thomas Penn, Esquire, one of the proprietors of the said province, and George Thomas, Esqr., with our royal approbation, Lieutenant Governor thereof, under John Penn; the said Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esqrs., true and absolute proprietaries of the said province and the Counties of Newcastle, Kent, and Sussex, upon Delaware, the great improvements and buildings made, and continuing to be made, in the said Town by the great increase of the inhabitants thereof, and hath humbly besought them for our letters patent, under the great seal of the said province, to erect the said Town of Lancaster into a Borough, according to certain limits and bounds hereinafter described, and to incorporate the freeholders and inhabitants of the same with perpetual succession, and to grant them such immunities and privileges, as might be thought necessary for the well-ordering and governing thereof. *Therefore, know ye,* that we, favoring the application of the said James Hamilton, on behalf of the said freeholders and inhabitants, and willing to promote, trade, industry, rule and good-order, amongst all our subjects, of our *Special Grace certain knowledge, and mere motion,* have erected, and by these presents do erect, the said Town of Lancaster, into a Borough, forever hereafter, to be called by the name of Lancaster, which said Borough shall extend, be limited, and bounded in the manner it is now laid out, pursuant to the plan thereof, hereunto annexed, and, we do further grant, and ordain, that the streets of the said Borough shall forever continue as they are now laid out and regulated; and, we do nominate and appoint Thomas Cookson and Sebastian Groffe, to be present Burgesses, and the said Thomas Cookson, shall be called the Chief Burgess, within the said Borough, and Michael Byerley, Matthias Young, John Dehoffe, John Folk, Abraham Johnson, and Peter Worrall assistants, for advising, aiding, and assisting the said Burgesses, in the execution

of the powers and authorities herein given them, and Alexander Gibboney, to be High Constable, and George Sanderson, to be Town Clerk, to continue Burgesses, Assistants, High Constable, and Town Clerk, until the fifteenth day of September, which, will be in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and forty-four, and from thence until others shall be duly elected or appointed in their places; as is hereinafter directed. And, we do by these presents, for us, our heirs and successors, further give, grant and declare, that the said burgesses, freeholders, and inhabitants within the Borough aforesaid, and their successors forever hereafter, shall be one body corporate and politic in deed and in name, and them by the name of the Burgesses, and inhabitants of the Borough of Lancaster, in the County of Lancaster, one body politic and corporate, in deed and in name, we do, for us, our heirs and successors, fully create, constitute, and confirm by these presents, and by the same name of the burgesses and inhabitants of the Borough of Lancaster, that they may have perpetual succession and that they and their successors by the name of the burgesses and inhabitants of the Borough of Lancaster, be, and at all times forever hereafter, shall be persons, able and capable, in law, to have, got, receive, and possess lands, tenements, rents, liberties, jurisdictions, franchises and hereditaments, to them, and their successors, in fee simple, or for term of life, lives, years, or otherwise, and also, goods, chattles, and other things of what nature or kind soever, and also, to give, grant, let, sell, and assign the same lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods and chattles, and to do and execute all other things about the same, by the named aforesaid. And, also, that they be and shall be forever hereafter, persons, able and capable in Law, to sue, and be sued, plead, and be impleaded, answer and be answered unto, defended, and be defended, in all, or any of our Courts or other places, and before any Judges, Justices and other persons, whatsoever, within the province aforesaid, in all manner of actions, suits, complaints, pleas, causes and matters whatsoever; and, that it shall and may be lawful to, and for, the burgesses and inhabitants of Lancaster, aforesaid, and their successors forever hereafter, to have and use one common seal for the sealing of all business, whatsoever, touching the said corporation, and the same from time to time at their will to change and alter. And, we do, for us, our heirs and successors, further by these presents, grant full power and authority for the burgesses, constable, assistants, and freeholders, together with such inhabitants, housekeepers, within the said Borough, as shall have resided therein at least for the space of one whole year, next preceeding any such election as is hereinafter directed, and hired an house and ground within the said Borough, of the yearly value of five pounds or upwards, on the fifteenth day of September, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and forty-four, and on that day, yearly, forever hereafter, unless it happen to fall on Sunday, and then on the next day following, publicly, to meet in some convenient place, within the said Borough, to be appointed by the Chief

Constable, then and there, to nominate, elect and choose, by the ballot, two able men, of the inhabitants of the said Borough, to be burgesses, one to be high constable, and one to be town clerk, and six to be assistants, within the same, for assisting the burgesses in the managing the affairs of the said Borough, and of keeping of peace and good order, therein, which election, shall be taken from time to time, by the high constable of the year preceding, and the names of the persons so elected, shall be certified under his seal to the governor, after such election. And, the burgess who shall have the majority of votes shall be so called, the Chief Burgess of the said Borough. But, in case it shall so happen that the said freeholders, and inhabitants, housekeepers, aforesaid, shall neglect or refuse to choose burgesses, and the other officers, in manner aforesaid, that then, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, for the time being, to nominate, appoint and commissionate burgesses, constable, town clerk, and assistants, for that year, *to hold* and continue in their respective offices until the next time of annual election, appointed as aforesaid, and so, as often as occasion shall require. And, we further will and ordain, that the said burgesses, for the time being, shall be and are hereby empowered and authorized to be conservators of the peace within the said Borough, and shall have power by themselves, and upon their own view or in any other lawful manner to remove all nuisances and encroachments on the said streets and Highways within the Borough aforesaid, as they shall see occasion, with power also, to arrest, imprison, and punish rioters, and other breakers of the peace or good behaviour; award process, bind to the peace or behaviour, commit to prison, and to make callenders of the prisoners, by them committed, and the same to return, together with such recognizances and examinations as shall be by them taken, to the next Court of Quarter Sessions, of the County of Lancaster, there, to be proceeded on as occasion may, or shall require, and to do all and singular, other matters and things, within the said Borough, as fully and effectually, to all intents and purposes, as Justices of the Peace, in their respective counties, can, or may lawfully do. But, before any of the said Burgesses, Constable, Town Clerk, or other officers, shall take upon them the execution of their respective offices, they shall take and subscribe the oaths, or affirmations of allegiance, and such other oaths and affirmations, as are by the Laws of our Government, in such cases provided, together with the oaths or affirmations for the due execution of their respective offices, and every Chief Burgess so elected or appointed from year to year as aforesaid, shall within ten days, immediately after his election, present himself to be qualified, by taking the oaths or affirmations aforesaid, before the Governor for the time being or such other person as the Governor shall think fit to appoint for that purpose; and, on failure of his so presenting himself, unless disabled by sickness, or other reasonable cause, such as shall be allowed of by the Governor for the time being, another Chief Burgess shall from time to time, and as often as occasion shall require, be appointed in the stead of such person

so failing to appear and qualify himself, as before is directed, which burgess so to be appointed by the governor for the time being, shall and may enjoy his office until the day of election, next ensuing, such, his appointment. And, the chief burgess having qualified himself in manner aforesaid, shall and may enter upon his office and other burgesses, constable, town clerk, or other officers shall and may qualify themselves for their respective offices by taking and subscribing the oaths or affirmations aforesaid, before the said chief burgess, or before any one of the justices of the peace of the said County of Lancaster, for the time being, who, are hereby authorized and empowered, to administer the same. And, we do further grant for us, our heirs and successors, to the burgesses, freeholders, inhabitants and housekeepers, aforesaid, and their successors, to have, hold and keep, within the said borough, two Markets in each week; that is to say, one market on Wednesday, and one market on Saturday, in every week of the year, forever, *in the lot of ground already agreed upon, for that purpose, and granted for that use, by Andrew Hamilton, Esqr., late of Philadelphia, deceased, as by the deeds thereof, to John Wright and others, Trustees for the said County of Lancaster, may appear.* And, also, two fairs therein every year, the first, to begin on the first day of June, next ensuing, and to continue that day, and the next day following; and the other of the said fairs, to begin on the twenty-fifth day of October, following, and to continue that day and the next day also, and when either of those days shall happen to fall on Sunday, then the said fairs to be kept the next day, or two days following together with the free liberties, customs, profits and emoluments, to the said markets and fairs, belonging or in anywise appertaining forever. And we do further grant and ordain, that there shall be a clerk of the market, for the said Borough, who shall have an assize of bread, wine, beer, wood and all other provisions, brought for the use of the said inhabitants, who shall and may perform all things belonging to the office of a clerk of the market, within the said Borough, and, that John Morris, shall be the present clerk of the market, who shall be removeable for any malfesance in his office, by the burgesses and assistants aforesaid, and another, from time to time, appointed and removed, as they shall find it necessary. And we do further grant unto the said burgesses, high constable, assistants, and their successors, as much as in us is, that if any of the inhabitants of the said Borough, shall be hereafter elected to the office of burgesses, high constable or assistants, and having notice of his or their election, shall refuse to undertake and execute that office, to which he is chosen; it shall and may be lawful for the burgesses, high constable and assistants, then acting to impose such moderate fines on the person or persons, so refusing as to them shall seem meet, so always that such fine, imposed on a burgess elect, do not exceed ten pounds, and the fine on the high constable, or an assistant elect, do not exceed five pounds, each to be levied by distress and sale of the goods, of the party re-

fusing by warrant, under the hand and seal of one of the said burgesses, or by any other lawful ways or means whatsoever, for the use of the said corporation. And in any such case it shall and may be lawful, for the said inhabitants, to proceed to the choice of some other fit person or persons, in the stead of such who shall so refuse. And, shall and may be lawful, for the said Burgesses, High Constable, and assistants, for the time being, to assemble Town meetings as often as they shall find occasion, at which meetings, they may make such ordinances and rules, not repugnant to or inconsistent with the laws of the said province, as the greatest part of the inhabitants shall deem necessary, or convenient for the good government of the said Borough, and the same rules and orders, to put in execution, and the same to revoke and alter and make anew, as occasion shall require, and also to impose such mulcts and amerciaments upon breakers of the said ordinances, as to the makers thereof, shall be thought reasonable, to be levied as above is directed, in case of fines to the use of the said Borough, without rendering any account thereof to us, our successors, or to the proprietaries aforesaid, their heirs, successors, also at the said meetings, to mitigate, or release the said fines or mulcts, upon the submission of the parties. And we do further will and grant, that where any doubts shall happen to arise touching this present charter, that the same shall in all Courts of law and equity, be construed and taken most favorably and beneficially, for the said Corporation. *In testimony whereof*, we have caused these, our letters to be made Patent; witness, *George Thomas, Esqr.*, with our Royal approbation, Lieutenant Governor of the Province aforesaid, under John Penn, Thomas Penn and Richard Penn, Esqrs., true and absolute proprietaries of the Province aforesaid, and of the Counties of Newcastle, Kent, and Sussex, on Delaware, the first day of May, in the fifteenth year of our reign. COURTS.

SUPREME COURT.

The Supreme Court holds six terms for arguments, &c., in the Five Districts of the State, and adjourned Courts as they may deem necessary. The regular Terms are—

For the Eastern District, composed of the City and County of Philadelphia, and the Counties of Delaware, Chester, Montgomery, Bucks, Northampton, Lehigh, Wayne, and Pike, at Philadelphia, in March, to continue two weeks, and 2d Wednesday in December, to continue three weeks. The last Monday in July, is the return day for July term, but no Court is then held.

For the Lancaster District, composed of the Counties of Lancaster, York, Dauphin, Lebanon, Schuylkill, and Berks, at Lancaster, 2d Monday in May.

For the Middle District, composed of the Counties of Northumberland, Union, Columbia, Centre, Mifflin, Juniata, and Huntingdon, McKean, Clearfield, Lycoming, Potter, Tioga, Bradford, Susquehanna, Wayne, and Luzerne, at Sunbury, 2d Monday in June.

For the Western District, composed of the Counties of Alleghany, Westmoreland, Somerset, Fayette, Washington, Greene, Beaver, Butler, Mercer, Crawford, Erie, Warren, Venango, Armstrong, Indiana, Jefferson, and Cambria, at Pittsburg, 1st Monday in September, to continue four weeks.

For the Southern District, composed of the Counties of Franklin, Adams, Cumberland, Bedford, at Chambersburg, on the Monday week next following the last week of the Term of the Western District.

RULES OF THE COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.

1st. In all cases of Reports of roads, heretofore returned to the Court, if exceptions be not filed on or before the third day of next sessions, the report shall be confirmed.

2d. In all cases of Reports of views of Roads, which shall hereafter be returned to the Court, the exceptions intended to be insisted on, shall be filed on or before the third day of the sessions, next, after the sessions to which the report shall be returnable; and, in all reports, reviews, and re-reviews, exceptions shall be filed within two days after the return and presentation to the Court of the said reviews or re-reviews. In default hereof in any case, the report shall be confirmed.

3d. All orders of views, or reviews of roads which shall hereafter be issued, shall be returned and presented to the Court on or before the third day of the sessions, to which the same are returnable, and the Clerk is directed to make this rule a part of every such order.

THE COMMON SCHOOLS.

PREPARED BY A MEMBER OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

The Common School System, as at present organized in this city, under the Common School Law, of the State, was adopted, on Monday, the 4th of June, 1838, by a vote of 584 to 1! On Monday, September 3, of the same year, the schools under the new and more liberal arrangement, commenced operations. The directors, under the present system, are composed of twelve citizens appointed by the Court of Quarter Sessions, twelve elected by the citizens, the Mayor, and the Presidents of the Select and Common Councils, being *ex officio*, members of the Board. The Board, as will be seen, is therefore composed of twenty-seven members. The first board, under the present organization, was composed of the following gentlemen:

The annual election takes place the first Tuesday of every May, when the Court also makes an appointment of the lawful number.

The *old* system, better known as “the Lancasterian system,” was under the charge of twelve gentlemen appointed by the Court, and progressed quite successfully; but it was not the Common School system—to some extent it recognised the pauper feature—and private schools, sustained by private expense, flourished in every part of the city. This has all been changed by the truly democratic system which is now in such an admirable state of forwardness. Private schools, if there are any, are very poorly attended; and even these are schools devoted either to the teaching of the mere rudiments to

very young children, or the higher branches—the classics, and other features of an advanced education. The children of all, rich and poor, high and low, mechanic and lawyer, may now be found in our Common Schools; and there is not, confessedly, out of Philadelphia, more flourishing or more successful schools. Professor BACHE, known as one of the most prominent friends of education in the country, and recently the head of that admirable institution, “the Philadelphia High School,” during a visit, one or two years ago, to Lancaster, passed a warm and deserved eulogium upon our Schools. Since the period of his visit, there has been much improvement in our schools.

At the time the last annual report was made, there were, on the rolls of the schools, 1,543 scholars.

“It may not be unacceptable to the citizens,” says the Annual Report, “to have a word added as to the actual arrangement of the schools.

“Each department, male and female, is divided into three grades: the Primary, the Secondary, and the High Schools.

“Having advanced so far as to be able to read with fluency and ease in the Primary Department, children are then transferred to the Secondary Schools, male or female, of the same ward. Each child, upon his transfer, receives a certificate, stating his proficiency, good conduct, &c. These transfers, which are always preceded by a particular examination, are made by a committee, called the Superintending Committee, and consisting of all the clergymen of the Board.

“Having advanced in the Secondary Department, as far as conjugation of verbs in grammar, and as far as Europe in geography, and gone through Emerson's Arithmetic No. 2, children are again trans-

ferred in the same manner, and with the same formalities, to their respective High Schools, where the course of instruction terminates."

THE OFFICERS OF THE BOARD at present are ROBERT MODERWELL, Esq., President; Treasurer, GEORGE MUSSER, Esq. salary \$75; Secretary, Mr. JOHN ZIMMERMAN, salary \$50; Messenger, Mr. MATHIAS ZAHM, jr., who receives fifty cents for each meeting of the board.

A VISITING COMMITTEE, for each ward, is appointed monthly, whose duty it is to attend at the schools every week, for the purpose of admitting new scholars, and to attend to any other matter that may require their attention.

THE SUPERINTENDING COMMITTEE, constituted as before mentioned, have a general supervision of the Schools. It is their duty to select the books that are to be made use of—to examine all applicants as teachers—and to transfer the children, when found qualified, from one department to another, and to attend any matters that may incidentally arise.

The directors of our schools are ardent friends of education, and active in discharging their duties. In their hands the system must become one of the most enduring monuments of public spirit and public liberality.

The Basin, situated between East King and East Orange streets, above Ann, will contain about two millions and a half gallons of water, and measures about two hundred feet square on the surface. The water is conveyed to the Basin from the Conestoga river, a half mile south-east of the city on a gradual elevation, rising two hundred and eighty feet, - by means of a forcing pump.

The number of dwellings in the city, now supplied with water, are 305.

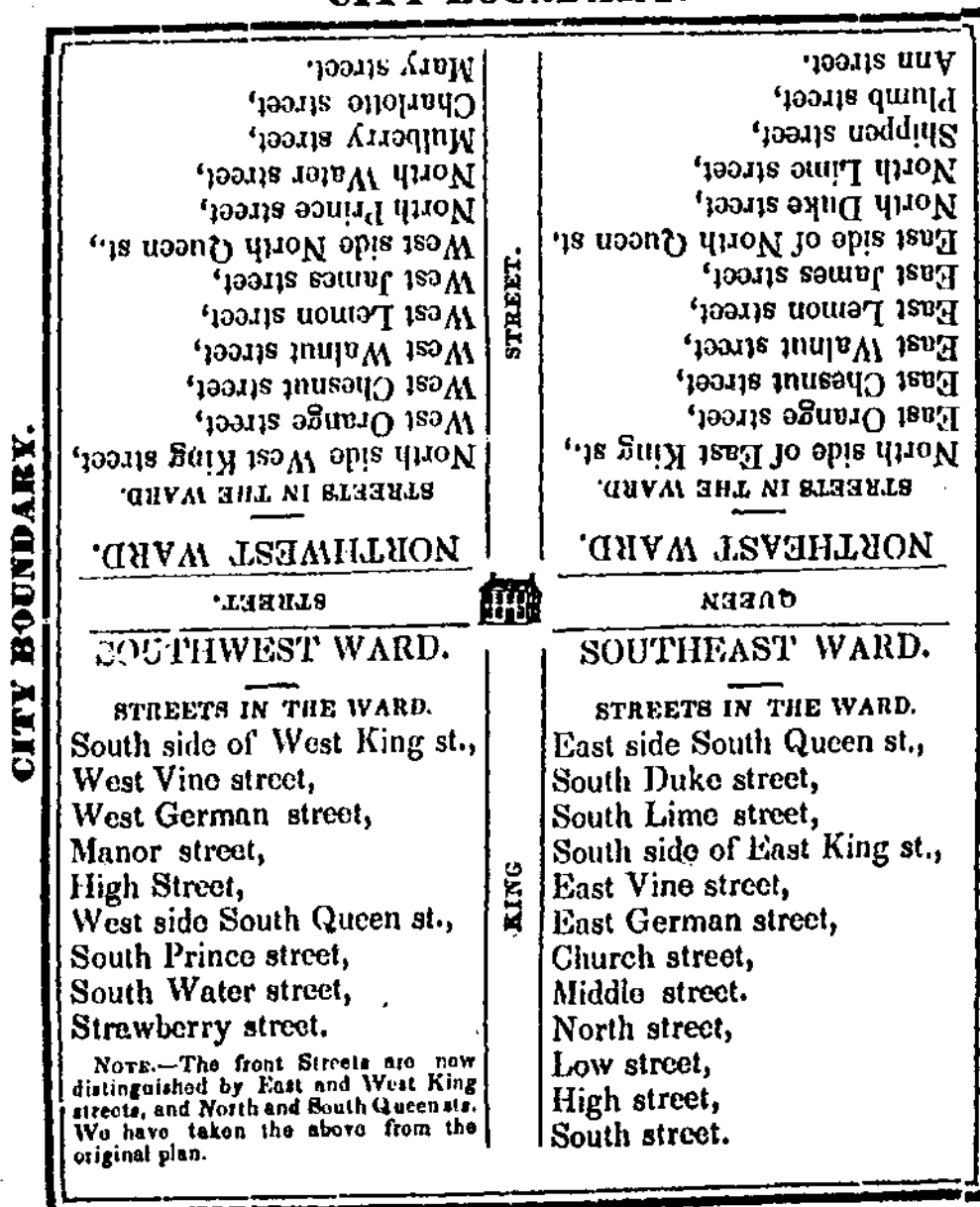
