Revenue Stamped Paper Of Colorado Territory

Prior to Colorado statehood on August 1, 1876 a limited variety of revenue stamped paper was used in Colorado Territory. These imprinted revenue stamps were used on checks, receipts, drafts, and certificates of deposit in place of adhesive revenue stamps. Although authorized by Congress in 1862, delivery of stamped paper did not commence until July, 1865. Eleven different types are reported used in Colorado Territory. These are referred to by the Scott's catalog as Types B to H, L,M,P, and Q.

Revenue stamped paper was produced by a limited number of security printers mostly located


in the East. As a result, such paper ordered and used by banks and financial institutions in Colorado Territory was limited. Virtually all of thus used is scarce to rare.

This exhibit will show a small selection of forerunner material bearing adhesive revenue stamps used in Colorado Territory from institutions that later used revenue stamped paper. Following these, the Territorial revenue stamped paper is shown organized by city, issuing institution and date. The final four pages of the exhibit show are post Territorial usages.

Colorado Territory Revenue Stamped Paper - Forerunners Denver







Both of the above checks show very early usage of revenue stamped paper in Colorado.










