## Nova Scotia: 1767-1868

The Nova Scotia postal system was under the direct control of the General Post Office in London from 1754 until 1851. In the pre-adhesive period prior to 1851 , postal markings followed the British pattern with new devices being introduced in standard forms.

In 1851 Nova Scotia became responsible for its own postal system. Postmaster General Woodhouse remained in charge until Nova Scotia became a Province of Canada in 1867. Adhesive postage stamps denominated in pence and shilling were introduced in the fall of 1851 . Bisecting of Nova Scotia stamps was authorized in 1854 to accommodate the new seven and one-half pence rate to England.

In 1860 Nova Scotia switched to a decimal currency and a new series of adhesive stamps were introduced with denominations in cents. These stamps remained in use until
 replaced by the Canadian issue in 1868.

This exhibit begins by tracing the development of the standard postal devices employed in Nova Scotia before the use of adhesive postage stamps. This is followed by a traditional presentation of the stamps and covers of the 1851 pence issue and the 1860 cents issue. The exhibit is organized as follows:

Pre-Adhesive Markings (Frame 1.)
A brief survey of pre-adhesive markings of Nova Scotia are shown with particular emphasis on the distribution of standard types of postal devices. Included is the earliest letter from Nova Scotia bearing a postmark.

1851-1857 Adhesive Pence Issues (Frames 2. and 3.)
Essays, proofs, unused stamps, used stamps, multiples, cancels and varieties are shown broken down by the various printings. This is followed by an extensive showing of on cover usages which includes a complete range of known bisects, and both unique quadrisects.

1860-1863 Adhesive Cents Issues (Frames 4. and 5.)
Essays, proofs, unused stamps, multiples and varieties are shown. Also shown are on cover usages with combinations, multiples and bisects.

## Nova Scotia Pence Issues Of 1851-1860

The 1851 issue stamps of Nova Scotia, although printed in several separate printings, were sent to Nova Scotia in only three shipments. The first and second shipments both occurred in the fall of 1851. The last shipment took place in July, 1857. Although some catalogs list several distinct shades, this exhibitor believes that only the two distinct shades of each value, representing the 1851 shipments and the 1857 shipment, deserve recognition. In 1853 a one penny value was added to the set. This stamp exists in only one shade from a single shipment made in April, 1853.

The bisecting of the three and six pence stamps was first authorized by Postmaster General Woodgate in October, 1854 specifically to make up the $71 / 2$ pence rate to Great Britain. Other bisects were accepted but not authorized. On January 1, 1860 Nova Scotia switched to a decimal currency and the pence issue was replaced.

## Nova Scotia Cents Issue Of 1860-1863

The pence issue stamps of Nova Scotia were replaced by an issuance of stamps denominated in cents in 1860 following the adoption of decimal currency in January.

Five different "cents" denominations were issued in October, 1860. An additional two cents value was added in May, 1863 to accommodate the new postal rate for letters within the same county. All of the stamps were engraved and printed by the American Bank Note Company of New York.

There were two printings of the two cents, eight and one half cents, ten cents and twelve and one half cents values. Three printings were needed for the one cent and five printings for the five cents value.

Although the issue has some very minor production varieties, the only major variety occurs on the one cent. It exists imperforate vertically. It is believed the five or six sheets were produced. Toned paper variations are reported existing in the same sheet with normal paper on some values.

This issue was gradually replaced by the stamps of Canada after Nova Scotia became part of the Confederation on July 1, 1867. In February, 1895 remainders of unused Nova Scotia stamps were sold by the government. There were no five cents stamps included.
