# P R E F A C E.

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**I**N large and populous cities, there is no publication more generally useful than a Directory.

The last by Clement Biddle, Esq. on account of its accuracy answered a most valuable purpose both to citizens and strangers; but on account of the frequent removal of the former, the accession of new inhabitants, and some other causes, the utility of such publications can be of no great duration. Three years have nearly elapsed since the last made its appearance. From the causes abovementioned a new one, at present, is obviously much wanted.

To this edition is subjoined a particular account of the different associations, literary institutions, and charitable establishments in this city. A perusal of this last must afford singular pleasure to the philanthropist; for, to the honour of Philadelphia, the means of relief are amply provided for the afflicted of every description. Here the sick, however poor, are well provided with every medical assistance, and every thing conducive to their recovery: the old and infirm are comfortably supported: the wants of the needy are supplied: the children of the indigent are instructed gratis: the rights of the oppressed African are vindicated: and the prison, which in most other countries tends only to harden offenders, has here, by the humanity of our laws, and the interposition of our benevolent citizens, answered, what certainly all punishment should be intended for, to reclaim many from their iniquitous courses, and to lead them to a sober and virtuous behaviour.—For information on these subjects the Editor is greatly indebted to several gentlemen of literary character, to whom he thus publicly returns his grateful acknowledgments.

There is likewise added the duties on goods, wares, and merchandize, the modes of transacting business at the custom-house, and extracts from several late acts of congress, which it is thought will be highly useful to the trading part of the community.

It was the intention of the Editor to have illustrated this Directory with a plan of the city; but as it was not possible to get a plate engraved so early as was necessary, it is in this edition unavoidably omitted. There is however annexed a particular list of the situations of the streets, lanes, and alleys, of the places appropriated to public worship, of public offices, &c. which it is expected will nearly answer the same purposes.

Through every part of this performance, the Editor has exerted himself to render the information contained as accurate as possible. He is however well aware, that in a publication of this nature, it is almost impossible entirely to avoid errors. For these, which he hopes are few, he solicits the excuse of a generous public.

I N F O R M A T I O N  
C O N C E R N I N G  
T H E C I T Y O F  
P H I L A D E L P H I A.

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**T**H E city was laid out by William Penn, the founder of the province in 1683, and settled by a colony from England, which arrived in that and the preceding years, and was increased by a constant and regular influx of foreigners, to so great a degree, that in less than a century, and within the lifetime of the first person born within it of European parents, it was computed to contain 6,000 houses and 40,000 inhabitants.

The ground plot of the city is an oblong square, and is intersected by a number of streets at right angles with each other, nine of which run East and West from Delaware to Schuylkill, and twenty three North and South, crossing the first at right angles, forming one hundred and eighty-four squares of lots for buildings. The streets running East and West are named (except High Street near the middle of the city) from the trees found in the country upon the arrival of the colony; Vine, Sassafras, Malberry, High, Chesnut, Walnut, Spruce, Pine, and Cedar streets, and those running North and South from their numeral order, Front, Second, Third, Fourth, &c. to Broad street, which is midway between the two rivers. In deeds and other descriptive writings which require exactness, these streets have the Delaware or Schuylkill prefixed to their numeral names, to distinguish to which front they belong; as Delaware Second Street, &c. but as there are very few buildings Westward of Broad Street, this addition is never made in common conversation, but when they are named they are always understood of the Delaware front unless Schuylkill be added.

A number of the streets of this city are now generally known by names different from those originally intended, thus Sassafras street is commonly called Race street, Broad street, Moravian alley, &c. In the directory the original names are retained, and in the list pointing out the situation of the streets, lanes, and alleys, their more common names are likewise mentioned.

The numbers in the streets, &c. lying East and West, begin with N<sup>o</sup> 1 on the North and N<sup>o</sup> 2 on the South sides at the river Delaware or other Eastern beginning of the street, and proceed regularly in the excess of two Westward, hence all the houses



marked with odd numbers are on the North sides of the way, and all those marked with even numbers on the South.

The numbers in the streets lying North and South, begin at the several corners of High Street, with N<sup>o</sup> 1 on the East and N<sup>o</sup> 2 on the West sides. High Street is considered as the common line of division, and the part of these streets lying North of it, has the addition of North to its name, and those lying South, the addition of South, the numbers proceed in each street from N<sup>o</sup> 1 on the East corner and N<sup>o</sup> 2 on the West corner, in excess of two Northward and Southward from High Street, having all the odd numbers on the East and all the even numbers on the West sides.

Thus if a stranger wishes to find any house in a main street, as N<sup>o</sup> 29, South Front Street, he will know from the odd number that it is on the East side of the way, from the word South, that it is Southward from High Street, from the word Front that it is the main street nearest to the river, and cannot be at a loss to discover the residence of any person whose name in the directory calls for a main street.

When the person sought resides in any other street, lane, or alley, the enquirer must turn to the alphabetical list of the lesser streets, &c. where he will find opposite to its name the main street from whence it begins, its direction whether East or West by the letters E. & W. or North and South by the letters N. S. prefixed, and proceeding to the intersection of it, he will discover the progress of the numbers and follow them till he finds the house sought.

Thus to find N<sup>o</sup> 60, Union Street, look under letter U in the list, and Union Street will be found to begin from the west side of Front Street between Spruce and Pine Streets, and extending E. & W. across three squares, to terminate at the East side of Fourth Street; now if you come to any intersection of Union Street you examine the first number you see; you know by the even number 60, that you are to seek on the South side, by the index and the progress of the numbers, and by the first number you meet, whether you are to go Westward for a higher or Eastward for a lower number.

The like modes serve for the lesser streets, &c. in a N. & S. direction, except that the odd numbers are on the East and the even numbers on the West side.

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*A list of the main streets in Philadelphia which run East and West between the Delaware and Schuylkill.*

High Street, commonly called Market Street, is the principal street in the city and near the centre.

Parallel to it on the north the first street is Mulberry commonly called Arch Street.

The second is Bassitas, commonly called Race Street.

The third is Vine Street.

And the fourth is Callowhill Street in the Northern Liberties.

On the So. side the first Street parallel to High Street is Chestnut Street.

The second, Walnut Street.

The third, Spruce Street.

The fourth, Pine Street.

And the fifth, Cedar, commonly called South Street.

**Dock St.** is the only crooked St. in Philadelphia, begins at the bridge in Front St. and extends north-westward in a serpentine track through two squares, across Second and Walnut Sts. and terminates at Third St.: another branch of it extends S. W. across Spruce St. and terminates in Second St.

**Drinker's court**, on the So. side of Union St. between Second and Third St.

THE speaker of the house of representatives receives 12 dollars, and each member of either house the sum of six dollars for



every day's attendance in congress; and at the commencement and end of every session six dollars for every twenty miles distance by the shortest road, between the seat of government and their respective habitations. The secretary of the senate and clerk of the house of representatives, have each an annual salary of 1500 dollars, and two dollars per day during the session.

After the 4th of March 1795, the members of the senate will receive seven dollars per day.

The chaplains of each house are allowed at the rate of 500 dollars per annum. The serjeant at arms of the house of representatives has 4 dollars per day during the session. The door keepers have each 500 dollars; and the assistant doorkeepers 450 dollars per annum.

annually at the seat of the general government, viz. on the first Monday in February, and on the first Monday in August.

The circuit court of the United States holds two sessions annually in each of the districts. In the district of Pennsylvania, this court is held on the 11th of April and 11th of November, at Philadelphia and York Town alternately.

The district courts of the United States hold four courts annually. That of Pennsylvania is held on the second Tuesdays in November, February, May, and August at Philadelphia.

*Note.* Exclusive of the abovementioned courts, the district judge may hold special courts at his discretion, at either of the places appointed for holding the stated courts, or at such other place in the district as the nature of the business and his discretion shall direct.

#### MINT OF THE UNITED STATES.

29, No. Seventh St.

AN Act was passed in April, 1792, for establishing a mint and regulating the coins of the United States.

The coins to be struck are to be of the following denominations and values.

#### GOLD COINS.

Eagles, each to be of the value of 10 dollars, and to contain 247  $\frac{4}{8}$ ths grains pure, or 270 grains of standard gold.

Half-Eagles, each to be of the value of five dollars, and to contain 123  $\frac{6}{8}$ ths grains of pure, or 135 grains of standard gold.

Quarter-Eagles, each to be of the value of two dollars and an half, and to contain 61  $\frac{7}{8}$ ths grains of pure, and 67  $\frac{4}{8}$ ths grains of standard gold.

#### SILVER COINS.

Dollars or units, each to be of the value of a Spanish milled dollar, and to contain 371  $\frac{5}{8}$ ths grains of pure, or 416 grains of standard silver.

Half-Dollars, each to be of half the value of the dollar or unit, and to contain  $185 \frac{1}{8}$ ths grains of pure, or 208 grains standard silver.

Quarter-Dollars, each to be one fourth of the value of the dollar or unit, and to contain  $92 \frac{1}{2}$ ths grains of pure, or 104 grains of standard silver.

Dimes, each to be of the value of one tenth of the dollar or unit, and to contain  $37 \frac{3}{8}$  grains of pure, or  $41 \frac{1}{2}$ ths grains of standard silver.

Half Dimes, each to be of the value of one twentieth of a dollar, and to contain  $18 \frac{3}{8}$ ths grains of pure, or  $20 \frac{1}{2}$ ths grains of standard silver.

By an act of January 14th, 1793, the weight of the cents and half-cents is established as follows:

Cents, each of the value of the hundredth part of a dollar, to contain 208 grains, and half cents to contain 104 grains of copper.

A pound of pure gold is valued equal to fifteen pounds pure silver.—Gold coins are to consist of eleven parts pure gold, and one part alloy.

The standard of silver coins shall be 1485 parts fine, to 179 parts alloy.

Persons in possession of bullion may have it coined free of expence.

By an act of May 8th, 1792,—It is enacted, That the cents and half-cents, as they shall be coined, be paid into the treasury of the United States, thence to issue into circulation; and that after the expiration of six calendar months from the time when there shall have been paid into the treasury a sum not less than 50,000 dollars, in cents and half cents, (of which notice shall be given in at least two news papers, published at the seat of government), no other copper coins shall pass as current money; and every person paying, offering to pay, or receiving in payment, any other coin, excepting cents and half cents, shall forfeit the said coin, and also the sum of ten dollars with costs of suit for the benefit of the person by whom information shall have been given.

Money of account of the United States shall be expressed in dollars or units, dimes or tenths, cents or hundredths, and mills or thousandths; a dime being the tenth of a dollar, a cent the hundredth, and a mill the thousandth. And all accounts in the public offices, and all proceedings in the courts of justice, shall be kept and had in conformity to this act.

A number of cents have been already issued, and it is expected that the coinage of gold and silver will commence in a short time.

Every double letter shall pay double the said rates, every triple letter, triple, every packet weighing one ounce avoirdupois, shall pay at the rate of four single letters for each ounce, and in that proportion for every greater weight.

All newspapers are to be charged with the payment of one cent for every distance not more than 100 miles, and one cent and an half for any greater distance; but printers of newspapers may send one paper to each and every other printer of newspapers in the United States free of all expence.

*The greatest punctuality must be observed at the Post Office. It is therefore necessary that letters be left precisely at the time appointed, in order to insure their going by the mail of the day.*

This respectable company was instituted in 1792, and began business in December of that year. Its capital consists of sixty thousand shares, of ten dollars each, amounting to six hundred thousand dollars, payable by easy instalments; the whole of which, with the amount of premiums, is a security to the persons insured, in case of loss.

The operations of this company are confined at present to insurance on vessels and cargoes, and any valuable property gone or going by land or water; but we understand it is in contemplation hereafter to insure lives, which are included in their constitution.

For the management of the company's affairs, the stockhold-

ers annually choose fifteen directors, who elect a president out of their own number, and the remaining fourteen divide themselves into seven committees, who, with the president, sit in weekly rotation, at their office.

The directors declare dividends of their profits semiannually.

The following RULES are to be observed in transacting business at the company's office, viz.

I. All orders for insurance must be given in writing, signed by the applicant; and as minute a description of the vessel is expected, as the person ordering the insurance can give, respecting her age, built, how found and fitted, and whether double or single decked.

II. All policies will be ready for delivery in twenty-four hours after the order for insurance is accepted at the office, and the policy must be taken up in ten days.

III. Notes, with an approved endorser, for all premiums, must be given in ten days, payable as follow, viz.

For American and West India risques, in three months after the date of the policy.

For European risques, in six months.

For China and East India risques, in twelve months.

For risques *by the year*, in eight months.

For risques *for six months*, in four months.

And, For risques for any lesser time, in three months.

IV. Losses will be paid in *ten days* after proof and adjustment; but if the note given for the premium shall not have become due within that time, the amount of it shall nevertheless be deducted from the loss to be paid.

## PENNSYLVANIA HOSPITAL.

The design of the hospital was first suggested by the late Doctor Thomas Bond, for the purpose of relieving the sick poor, whether afflicted in body or mind.

This benevolent plan was greatly approved, and many contributors appeared to support it.

In 1752, they hired a house of the late John Kinsey in High Street, into which their first patients were admitted.

They were continued therein until the year 1756, that being the time when the present building, called the Eastern wing, was completed.

In 1773, they received about twelve thousand pounds, from the unclaimed shares of the Pennsylvania Land Company in London. For this act of the British parliament in their favour, they owe much to the unceasing labours of their great friends the late Doctor John Fothergill, Sylvanus Bevan, Jacob Hagen, and others.

The productive estate at interest in 1774 being its highest amount was about 22,000 l. of this they lost, by receiving continental money for hard, about ten thousand pounds.

Discouraged, though not depressed, the managers again solicited subscriptions, and thus by a slow but certain progression, they advanced the capital stock in 1793, to its present amount of

Of the abovementioned sum the assembly gave of their constituents money about 5,500 l. to reimburse the expence of the present building. The balance being twenty five thousand eight hundred and thirty pounds, are private legacies, grants, and donations, the whole of which would lapse to the commonwealth if the contributors fail, an event which is at present but little thought of.

Besides the above sum, the expence of the hospital poor has been paid by the contributors forty years.

In addition to the 5,500 l. given by the legislature to raise the eastern wing, they at their last session have granted a further sum of ten thousand pounds out of a loan office fund, for the purpose of enlarging the hospital on its original plan, so as to admit a greater number of lunatics, and to obtain a due separation of them from the sick.

The last act allows a lying-in and foundling hospital to be united with this institution, whenever a fund especially is given to build and support the same.

The medical pupils pay for the privilege of attending the hospital practice; and such pay is commonly understood to be a perquisite of the hospital physicians; this, however, they have generously given up for the purpose of founding a medical library, and to purchase Doctor Choquet's preparations; by the addition of which to Dr Fothergill's valuable present, the institution without any expence to its funds, is possessed of the most useful and ornamental collection, that was ever seen in America. The pay of those pupils exceeds 100 l. per annum, which is amply sufficient to furnish the library with new books, and to preserve the anatomical castings, &c.

From the time the hospital was built in 1756, to the 5th month (May) in 1793, there have been admitted 8,608 patients.

Of whom 38 are on pay, and 15 poor, and 34 are lunatics, or such as have lost the use of their reason: some of these have been from 20 to 30 years in the house, which is not uncommon for that description of people.

A great number whose disorders were not proper for admission, have received medicine from the hospital dispensary, gratis, and the best advice from the physicians thereof.

The managers are by charter prohibited from spending any



part of their capital stock, the interest of which, with such donations as are not expressly given thereto, is applied for the poor; and when as many paupers are first admitted as will absorb the said income, then if there is room, the managers may take other patients on pay, the profits of whose board also go to the poor. Of such pay patients, there will always be a number, until the said income, which at present is not half equal to the expenses of the house, become sufficient to occupy it with the poor.

The price of pay patients is various, and sometimes changes. The overseers of the poor of Pennsylvania, and all societies therein, who support the poor by private and voluntary subscriptions, pay only 8s. 4d. per week, including medicines, attendance, and all charges, except clothing.

The overseers of any other State pay fifteen shillings, and private persons from 10s. to 35s. as they and the managers can agree; these may choose their own physician, provided he is one of the hospital physicians, no others being admitted to practice in the house.

All patients are to submit to the orders of the physicians respecting their cases, and to the rules of the managers in respect to their conduct, or be discharged. No amputation of a limb is allowed, without a consultation of physicians, and three at least agreeing.

The instruments are the most complete of the kind, and preserved in excellent order for use; and every thing convenient for the patient is always provided.

A resident apothecary lives in the house: his duty is to receive and lend out books, to administer the prescriptions, and to summon the physicians on every urgent occasion; each of whom considers it as his duty immediately to attend. Two managers and physicians meet at the hospital every Fourth-day (Wednesday) and Seventh-day (Saturday), at 11 in the forenoon, to receive and discharge patients, and much trouble is saved to those who apply at that time.

At other times the applicant must first go to an attending physician, who, if he considers the case a proper one, certifies it in writing to a fitting manager, and he takes the security and gives the order of admission.

Overseers of the poor from the country, who bring a patient, are expected to produce a certificate signed by two magistrates, certifying that they are in office, and that the pauper resides in their district, without which the applicant is rejected.

Persons afflicted with incurable and infectious disorders are not admitted; but any person in Pennsylvania receiving by accident a desperate wound, or a fractured limb, may be brought to the hospital without an order, provided he is brought immediately after the accident happens, and such persons, whether stran-

gers or citizens, will be taken good care of at the contributors expence.

The name of the corporate body is, The Contributors to the Pennsylvania Hospital. Legacies are usually devised to them in this form, "I give to the contributors to the Pennsylvania hospital and their successors, L. for the use of the said hospital," or, "I give to the contributors of the Pennsylvania hospital, L. to be added to the capital stock."

A contributor must pay at least L 10, for which he receives a certificate from the treasurer; this he cannot transfer, nor can he receive any benefit therefrom, but the privilege of electing and being elected.

If he is chosen a manager, physician, or treasurer, he must serve without fee or reward.

An institution formed on such humane and benevolent principles, embracing the poor of all descriptions, has done great honor to its founders, many of whose pious successors have been led by a secret impulse to endow it with occasional legacies and contributions, whereby the trust is enlarged, and a greater number of the sick are relieved; many of whom, for want of such an asylum, would suffer in solitary places, whilst the poor unhappy maniac, deprived of his senses, would be roving about without knowing a home, at the risque of his life or the lives of the people.

Is an endowment for aged women of the Protestant Episcopal church, made by Dr John Kearsly, formerly an eminent Physician in this city; who bequeathed, for this purpose, an estate chiefly landed, which he vested in the rector, church wardens, and vestrymen of the united Episcopal churches of Christ church and St. Peter's.

Since the endowment of this institution, it has received a considerable accession of property, by the gift of Mr Joseph Dobbins, a native of this city, now residing in Carolina; subject to an annuity during Mr Dobbins' life.

Dr Kearsly's will requires, that the women belonging to this institution shall be supplied with meat, drink and lodging; with necessary assistance in physic and surgery.—There are now 19 on the foundation.

PHILADELPHIA DISPENSARY,  
68, Chestnut St.

Was instituted in April, 1786.—The object of this charity is, to afford medical relief to the indigent sick; and so extensive have been the benefits thereof, that between eleven and twelve thousand patients have been already under its care.—It is supported by annual contributions of one guinea, or ten guineas a life subscription. The contributors recommend the patients. They also annually elect, from among themselves, twelve managers, who direct the business of the institution generally, and every year appoint six attending and four consulting physicians and surgeons, an apothecary and treasurer. The attending physicians are on duty in rotation, two at a time for two months.

The city is divided into two districts; and the patients resident in these are under the care of the respective physicians. Such of them as are able to go out, receive medical assistance at the dispensary (where the apothecary resides and medicines are kept) on the six days of the week: those who cannot go abroad, are visited at their own houses. It is needless to enlarge on this institution, as it must be sufficiently evident from the plan and the success hitherto attending it, that it is the most useful and extensive mode of affording medical relief to our distressed fellow creatures of any that has hitherto been devised.

THE SOCIETY FOR ALLEVIATING THE MISERIES  
OF PUBLIC PRISONS,

Was instituted in the month of May 1787. The object of the institution may be known from the duties of the acting committee, as laid down in the 7th article of the constitution, as follows.

“The acting committee shall visit the public prisons, or such other places of confinement or punishment as are ordained by law, at least once every week. They shall enquire into the circumstances of the persons confined; they shall report such abuses as they shall discover, to the officers of government, who are authorised to redress them; and shall examine the influence of con-



finement or imprisonment upon the morals of the persons who are the subjects of them."

The benefits resulting from this society may be comprehended under the following heads, viz.

I. Relief, in money and in provision, afforded to suffering prisoners; which the society's committee have been enabled to accomplish, to a considerable extent; partly by means of the annual contributions of the members, and partly by directing the distribution of what is occasionally given in money and in victuals. Under this head may be reckoned the sometimes paying of small fees, when the case seemed to deserve it, and when the party would otherwise have been detained for them in confinement.

II. Applications to the magistracy for the enlargement of persons illegally confined, which has sometimes happened from the obscurity and friendless conditions of the parties.

III. Complaints successfully made to the proper officers, of offences against law, in the management of the jail, especially the sale of spirituous liquors, occasioning the corruption of young offenders, and the hardening of the old.

IV. Legislative improvements in the penal laws, in a great measure, is owing to the solicitations of the society.

Since the legislature's giving their attention to the making of such improvements, and especially since the appointment of a board of inspectors with legal powers, composed of members of this society, it was thought expedient to alter the constitution, limiting the meetings to once a year; at which time a committee is chosen, who meet in the interval to transact all necessary business.

As the society's exertions have confessedly had a considerable effect in producing the present improved state of the public prison, it may be proper to mention the evidences of the improvement in the prohibition of spirituous liquors, the separation of the sexes, the cleanliness of the apartments, and the employing of the prisoners, in useful labor. In regard to the last article, it is worthy of the public notice, that some of the prisoners, on the expiration of their terms, have received a balance due to them from their labours, after deducting for their maintenance. The punishment of refractory criminals is the secluding of them from society, in cells, elevated above the ground and not having a ground floor; but without loading them with irons.

To aid the influence of these regulations, the clergy of different religious denominations occasionally attend for the purposes of public prayer and preaching.

### THE HUMANE SOCIETY,

Was instituted in the year 1780, for the purpose of recovering persons supposed to be dead from drowning; and considerable benefit accrued from their laudable exertions. But either from the objects being too confined, or from the difficulty of conveying the members, (all of whom were to attend the meetings,) or from the late war, the operations of the society were for a long time suspended; until the year 1787, when a number of the members again met, and concluded, that the business would be best conducted by twelve managers, chosen annually by the contributors, and that it would be of great importance to extend their objects, not only for the original purpose of endeavouring to restore to life those who were supposed dead from drowning; but also such as were in the same situation from many other circumstances; such as exposure to heat or cold, drinking cold water, damps, lightening, suffocation from charcoal, &c. It was accordingly agreed to embrace all these objects. The managers have therefore not only published proper rules to be observed in such cases, but also placed the necessary apparatus in different parts near the river, and given premiums to such persons as have been instrumental in saving the lives of their fellow creatures, exposed to accidents of this kind.

It is sincerely to be wished that, in imitation of the humane society in Boston, they may be enabled to provide for the relief of shipwrecked seaman. The present funds arise out of a contribution of one dollar annually, from each of the subscribers.

### HOUSE OF EMPLOYMENT.

Is a large and commodious building, situated in Spruce between Tenth and Eleventh Sts. where the poor of the city and some adjoining townships are supported and employed in some coarse manufactures to aid in defraying their expences under the care of the overseers and guardians of the poor, who are a corporate body created for this purpose by act of assembly, with power to lay taxes for its farther support.

### FRIENDS' ALMS HOUSE

Is situated in Walnut St. on the south side, between Third and Fourth Sts.

The Friends alms house is supported by that society for the use of their own poor. It is divided into a number of separate houses and rooms for families or single persons who have fallen into decay, most of whom by their industry contribute to their own support, but are supplied with whatever necessaries their industry falls short of procuring by a committee of the society; and thus live more comfortably than many, who, in full health and unhurt by accident provide for their own subsistence.

### COLLEGE OF PHYSICIANS OF PHILADELPHIA.

IN the year 1787, the physicians of this city associated themselves under this title, for the purpose of extending medical know-

ledge, and of promoting harmony and uniformity in the practice of physic.

In 1789, they obtained a charter of incorporation from the legislature.

They hold stated meetings on the first Tuesday of every month, for the purposes of their institution, and are about publishing the first volume of their transactions. A foundation for a medical library is already begun, which is constantly increasing. The college consists of fellows (or resident members) and associates.

FIRST DAY OR SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

"THE society for the institution and support of First-day or Sunday schools in the city of Philadelphia and the districts of Southwark and the Northern Liberties," was instituted early in the year 1791. The members then formed a constitution for their government, by which the society is to meet every three months, viz. on the second Third-day called Tuesday, in the months called January, April, July, and October, in every year. The affairs of the institution in the recess of the society are conducted by twelve of its members, who are called *Visitors*, three of whom form a board to do business, they meet monthly, have the charge of the schools, the expenditure of money, &c.

The society is formed of all those persons who subscribe the constitution, and pay to the treasurer at the time of subscribing and annually afterwards one dollar; but ten dollars in one payment constitutes a member during life, which subscriptions form a fund to defray the expences of the institution.

Three schools were opened in March 1791, since which about nine hundred scholars have been admitted, and have partaken of its advantages; and there are at this time more than three hundred on the list of attendance.

One of these schools for girls is under the care of John Ely, in the rear of Mulberry street meeting; the two others for boys, one of which is under the care of John Poor in Cherry street, the other under Thaddeus Brown in Front near Almond street.



It is a particular rule with the society, that the scholars come clean to the schools, and attend the places of worship to which they respectively belong.

By this benevolent institution the children of many of the poorer part of the community who would otherwise have been running through the streets habituating themselves to mischief, are rescued from vice and inured to habits of virtue and religion; and it is with great pleasure that the board of Visitors have observed that the improvement in reading and writing made by the children in these schools answers their most sanguine expectations. From these favourable appearances the board have had it in contemplation to extend further the advantages of the institution by the establishing of other schools, but for this the funds are at present inadequate. Depending, however, on the well-known readiness of their fellow-citizens to assist in every undertaking which has humanity for its object, they have appointed a committee of 24 to solicit subscriptions, and there is little doubt of the society being speedily able to render their plan more extensively useful.

#### ABOLITION SOCIETY.

THE society for promoting the abolition of slavery, and the relief of free negroes unlawfully held in bondage, was first instituted in the year 1774, and afterwards enlarged both in its objects and members on the 23d of April 1787. The zeal and activity of this society have been crowned with uncommon success, and has given rise to many similar societies in the other states; and has also been instrumental in suggesting to the legislature most of those improvements in the laws which relate to the complete abolition of slavery, which have been enacted since the memorable law of March 1st, 1780, which first laid the axe to the root of this abo-



minable evil; and lastly, it has been the happy means of procuring the emancipation of several thousand blacks, who were detained in bondage contrary to the laws of the state. The stated meetings of the society are on the first Mondays of January, April, July, and October. These meetings are generally large, and composed of persons of all the different religious sects in the city. Business is conducted with great order and harmony. Dr Franklin was president of this society for several years before his death and took great pleasure in discharging all the duties of that station. Each member pays 10 s. a-year towards the expenses of the society. This money is employed chiefly in defraying the cost and other charges which are incurred by the emancipation of negroes unlawfully held in bondage. #### UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA.

The history of this seminary necessarily involves in it the history of two other seminaries; now generally distinguished by the names of the old college and the old university.

The old college consisted of three parts; the charitable schools, the academy, and the college, strictly so called. The *charitable schools*, which were two in number, were intended; the one, for the reception of thirty girls, to be taught reading, writing, and sewing; the other, for the reception of sixty boys, who were to be instructed in reading, writing, and arithmetic. The *Academy* comprehended three schools; an English school, a school for arithmetic and the practical branches of the mathematics, and a Latin and Greek school. The *college* was divided into two schools; one, for teaching the philosophy of body, (i. e. physics or natural philosophy), in conjunction with the higher branches of the mathematics; another, for the philosophy of mind or spirit, (i. e. natural theology, psychology or the philosophy of the human mind, moral philosophy, and logic), in conjunction with the higher classics.

These several parts were not all instituted at the same time. The charitable schools and the academy were opened in the year 1750; under the direction of a board of trustees, consisting of twenty-four members, who however were not incorporated

until the year 1753. These being well conducted, and continuing to flourish, the trustees were encouraged to extend their designs still further; and, in 1754, opened the philosophical schools. And as this addition to their plan rendered the charter which had been already granted them inadequate, they solicited, and in the following year obtained, a new one; which put all the several parts abovementioned under the same direction, and gave to the whole, the style of The College, Academy, and Charitable Schools of the city of Philadelphia, in Pennsylvania.

After this, in the year 1765, were added the medical schools; consisting of four professorships: one of the theory and practice of physic; another of anatomy; another of botany and materia medica; and another of chemistry.

Such was the origin of this institution. Though intended for the benefit of the public in general, and though it could not be carried on but at a very considerable expense, it was altogether the work of a few private citizens of Philadelphia: but among these was Dr Franklin; by whom the design was originally projected, and the proposals for carrying it into execution drawn up and published.

Soon after the revolution, however, in the year 1779, there passed an act of the legislature, entitled, "An act to confirm the estates and interests of the college, academy, and charitable schools of the city of Philadelphia; and to amend and alter the charters thereof, conformably to the revolution, and to the constitution and government of this commonwealth; and to erect the same into an university."

By virtue of this act, the seminary was placed under the direction of a new board of trustees, a few of whom had been members of the old board; the style of it changed from that of The College, Academy, and Charitable Schools, &c. to that of The University of the state of Pennsylvania; and the executive council authorised to set apart, for its use, so many of the confiscated estates as would produce an additional income of fifteen hundred pounds a year.

Hence arose what is now called the Old University; and from this era it's history commences. It was the old college erected into an university; that is, it was the old college under a different name, and subjected to some new modifications. Nor did these modifications extend farther than to things merely external; its trustees, its style, its revenues, and its connection with the state. In itself it was still the same: it had still the same charitable schools, the same academical schools, the same philosophical schools, and the same medical schools.

But the Trustees of the old college, and their Provost, petitioning, that their charter, and the property which they had formerly held, might be restored to them; and the legislature, in the year 1789, thinking fit to comply; there began at length to ex-

ist, what in the beginning had not been contemplated, two distinct seminaries; The University of the state of Pennsylvania, and, at the same time, The College, Academy, and Charitable schools of the city of Philadelphia.

Neither of these seminaries, however, being possessed of funds sufficient to defray the expense of conducting it; and it not being likely that the legislature would be prevailed on to grant the money of their constituents, for the farther endowment of two seminaries of general learning in the same city, where, confessedly, but one of them was wanting; each party became every day still more and more convinced of the necessity of an union. Conferences for this purpose began to be held. And in the end it was mutually agreed, that the two boards should, each of them, prefer to the legislature a similar petition; praying, that, on certain conditions to be therein specified, both seminaries should be consolidated into one. These conditions were, That each board should select 12 of it's members to constitute a new board; of which the governor of the state for the time being should be president; and that, whatever might be the number of professors which this new board should think fit to establish, such professors should be chosen equally out of the two faculties, belonging, the one to the old college, and the other to the old university; unless the number to be thus established should be an odd number; in which case the odd number should be taken from either of the faculties indiscriminately.

These petitions were presented; the legislature approved of the proposal; and accordingly, in the year 1791, an act was passed, entitled, "An act to unite the University of the state of Pennsylvania, and the College, Academy, and Charitable schools of Philadelphia, in the commonwealth of Pennsylvania."

And thus was, in the end, erected the seminary, now called The University of Pennsylvania; still consisting of the same schools of which the old college consisted.\*

From this estimate, \* in which, considering the great expense of living in this city, the salaries proposed are undoubtedly very moderate; and into which no expenditure is admitted but what is absolutely necessary; it appears, that the funds are deficient, to a much greater degree than is generally apprehended. But this deficiency, it is not doubted, the legislature will readily and cheerfully supply. That education is an object of great importance; and that no nation can be qualified for the enjoyment of civil liberty, or can long continue to preserve it, the people of which are ignorant and unenlightened; are truths now well known and almost universally admitted. Neither indeed would it be consistent with the dignity of the state, or with the honour of the legislature, to have an University, and to give it the style of the University of Pennsylvania, and yet not allow to the professors and other teachers employed in it, what will enable them to live by their profession, with decency and comfort.

#### EPISCOPAL ACADEMY.

The academy of the protestant Episcopal church was instituted

on the first day of January 1785; a subscription having been opened for the purpose in the end of the preceding year. The fundamental laws of the institution were enacted on the said day, at a general meeting of the subscribers, and are still its constitution, being recognised and confirmed in the act of incorporation granted by the legislature, about two years after the establishment of the seminary.

This Institution, besides its free schools, had three others; one, for the Latin and Greek languages; another, for arithmetic and the practical mathematics; and the third, for the English language. These have been for some time suspended; and the only schools now open are the free schools; consisting of about 80 boys and 40 girls: but the trustees have lately, by advertisement, signified their intention of re-opening the other schools, as soon as a satisfactory matter can be procured. The free schools are kept at 62, Union St. that for the boys being under the care of John Barry, and that for the girls under the care of Mrs. Barnes.

#### OF THE AFRICAN SCHOOLS.

WHILE the society of Friends, and the abolition society have been exerting themselves, with success, to ameliorate the situation of the unfortunate Africans, they have also extended their benevolence to their children, for whose education they have made ample provision. About the year 1770, a school was instituted by private subscription of the Friends, with a view to prepare that degraded race for a better situation in civil life: but the will of Anthony Benezet, of benevolent memory, a considerable donation from the society of Friends in England, and some other charitable devices have provided funds nearly adequate to its future support; so that in a short time it will no longer be burthensom to individuals.

The school is kept in Willing's alley. The boys are taught by Daniel Britt, and the girls by his wife. The school is visited once a month by a committee appointed by the three monthly meetings of Philadelphia: and it is pleasing to observe that the progress of the pupils has hitherto answered the most sanguine expectations of its humane institutors.

There is also a school for the blacks supported by the abolition society, in Cherry St. kept by Helena Harris, a black woman of considerable parts, who had been for several years employed as a teacher of white children in England.

### OF THE OTHER SEMINARIES IN PHILADELPHIA.

ALMOST every religious society have one or more schools under their immediate direction, for the education of their own youth of both sexes, as well of those who are able to pay, as of the poor, who are provided with books and stationary gratis; besides which there are a number of private schools, under the direction of masters and mistresses, independent of any public body. There are also several academies for the tuition of young ladies in all the branches of polite literature, a particular description of which would be too lengthy for the present publication. Let it therefore suffice, that there is no individual, however poor, whose children, on proper application, may not be admitted into some one of these schools free of expence.

### PHILADELPHIA LIBRARY.

Fifth, between Chestnut and Walnut Streets.

THE foundation of the present library was laid in the year 1731, a period when Philadelphia afforded little assistance to the enquiries of the studious. A number of gentlemen having raised the sum of one hundred pounds by subscription, a small library was formed upon principles the best calculated to disseminate knowledge: the books were not, as in many of the public libraries of Europe, confined to the apartments, but the subscribers were allowed to carry them home for a reasonable space of time.

The plan soon became popular; accessions to the number of members took place, and the stock of books was annually encreased by purchases at the company's expence, and liberal donations from persons both at home and abroad.

The then proprietaries of Pennsylvania appear to have taken a patriotic pleasure in the encouragement of the plan. Besides several valuable donations, they granted a charter of incorporation in the year 1742.

A spirit of literary improvement made its way among all classes of people, and the philanthropy of the great and amiable character\* who suggested the plan, was gratified by tracing the books as well into the hands of the opulent, with whom literature is sometimes no more than one of the ornaments of civil life, as among those to whom it renders a more substantial benefit. Letters, while they employ the leisure of the artist, reconcile him to his labour; by removing grosser relaxations they promote his health, while they enlarge his mind; and prolong his life, while they teach him to enjoy it.

The respectable and intelligent character of the latter class of people in Philadelphia and its environs, cannot be referred to a more probable cause, than the habits of reading promoted by this institution.

The great utility and success of this measure, occasioned the formation of other libraries upon similar principles. But as it

appeared more conducive to the interests of literature, to be possessed of one large, than of several smaller collections of books, coalitions gradually took place among them, till the Amicable, the Association, and the Union Companies were blended with the Library Company of Philadelphia, the title conferred by the charter.

Since this event, which took place in the year 1769, the members and the property of the company have continued to increase; the former being now between five and six hundred in number. The number of volumes, at present, amounts to eight thousand, the selection of which, has in general been calculated to promote the more important interests of society. And the stock of books is continually increased by occasional donations, annual importations, and purchases of every American production of merit.

Some valuable machines and apparatus for the purposes of natural philosophy, &c. and a variety of curious artificial and natural productions also belong to the company, and are deposited in their apartments. In the catalogue heretofore published, particulars have not been inserted, but lists are in the possession of the librarian, who attends to show them at stated times,\* and the directors, on proper occasions, permit the instruments to be made use of.

Besides the collection, the personal property consists of some monies at interest; the sales of shares, which since the year 1768, have been fixed at ten pounds,† and the annual payment of ten shillings from each member.

A house and lot of ground which belonged to the Union Company; two lots of ground (one the generous donation of the late Thomas Penn, Esq.) and several ground rents constitute the real estate.

The members hold the property as tenants in common, and dispose of their shares by will or deed; but the assent of the directors, as well in such cases as in case of an original purchase, is previously necessary—a restriction early adopted, in order, as much as possible, to prevent improper persons from having access to a collection of a nature so liable to injury.

Ten directors and a treasurer are annually elected by the members: the directors appoint a secretary and a librarian.

## LOGANIAN LIBRARY,

Was instituted by the late James Logan, Esq. a gentleman of consummate literature who in the course of a long life had collected a number of the most rare and curious books, in almost all the ancient languages. He built a house for their reception and by deed executed in his life time, vested the house and lot, together with the books and some yearly rents for supporting a librarian, and occasionally encreasing the catalogue, in trustees for the use of the public forever, under certain rules and regulations contained in the instruments. Sometime afterwards he cancelled this deed, and prepared another, which he did not live to execute; this unfinished instrument varied the regulations in some respects, and the funds for the support of the institution, but the uses were the same as in the first. After his death, his children and residuary devisees executed a deed conformable to that which had been prepared by him, vesting in the same trustees the whole estate intended by the founder, and the books were removed to a room prepared for them, arranged in neat order, and a catalogue printed. By the constitution, William Logan the founder's eldest son was the first librarian, and the office was made hereditary in his family, with power to execute it by a deputy. The funds appointed for a librarian, &c. were originally small, but issued from a very improving estate; they were so reserved as to increase at stated periods, so as to afford a very handsome income; till one of these periods arrived they were not sufficient for the regular support of a librarian, wherefore he attended a considerable time to the duty in person, and whenever a man of letters could be procured upon terms within bounds, he was employed as deputy. William Logan by his will, devised a very handsome library, collected partly by himself and partly by his uncle the late Doctor William Logan of Bristol in England to this institution, amounting to about one thousand volumes. After his death, which happened in 1776, the library was shut for several years, owing to the death or absence of all the trustees. In 1791, James Logan, the only surviving trustee, named in the grant, having had several previous consultations with Dr Franklin, the latest decedent of them, and with a number of his fellow citizens, presented a memorial to the legislature, wherein he stated the then present situation of the institution, and prayed for their aid to put it into a way of answering the end of his father the founder. Whereupon an act was passed, whereby the directors of the library company of Philadelphia, their successors, &c. for the time being, together with James Logan, or his heir and two trustees, whom he or his heir shall appoint (a majority of the whole of whom shall be a quorum) shall be trustees of the said Loganian library. It is, however, provided, that the said books and other property belonging to the Loganian library, together with such other property as may hereafter be acquired, shall be for ever kept sepa-

rate from the books belonging to the library company of Philadelphia, and that the said library shall be known by the name of The Loganian Library, agreeably to the intention of the donor. A large and commodious room has lately been built adjoining the Philadelphia library, for the purpose of keeping the books of the Loganian library, which, it is expected, will be opened in a short time for the benefit of the citizens.

#### AMERICAN PHILOSOPHICAL SOCIETY.

THE American philosophical society, for promoting useful knowledge, was formed in the year 1769, by the union of two societies, which had been instituted with similar views, viz. the advancement of useful knowledge. One of these, stiled The American philosophical society, was instituted in the year 1743, and at the time of their union consisted of 127 members; the other, stiled The American society for promoting and propagating useful knowledge, held in Philadelphia, was instituted in the year 1766, and at the time of their union consisted of 78 fellows and 69 corresponding members.

At the first meeting of this united society, viz. on the 2d of January, 1769, the following gentlemen were elected as officers for that year, viz.

By an act of the legislature of Pennsylvania, passed in the month of March, 1780, the society was incorporated, and the president of the executive council, (now governor of this commonwealth) made patron of the society.

In the year 1787 M. John Hyacinth de Magellan of London, presented to the society a donation of two hundred guineas, to be by them vested in a secure and permanent fund, to the end that the interest arising therefrom should be annually disposed of in premiums, to be adjudged by the society, to the author of the best discovery or most useful invention relating to navigation, astronomy, or natural philosophy: The premium to consist of an oval

plate of solid standard gold of the value of ten guineas, with suitable devices engraved thereon.

Three of these premiums have, since the establishment of this fund, been awarded by the society, viz. one in the year 1790, and two in the year 1792.

The society have now published three volumes of their transactions. The first volume was published in the year 1771, the second in the year 1786, and the third in the present year, 1793.

Aided by the liberal donations of a number of friends and patrons of philosophy, both in America and Europe, and especially the legislature of Pennsylvania, the society have been enabled to erect, on part of the state-house square in fifth, between Chestnut and Walnut Sts. a commodious, and not inelegant building, where they now hold their stated meetings.

#### PHILADELPHIA SOCIETY FOR PROMOTING AGRICULTURE.

They hold stated meetings every two months, as well for the purpose of receiving communications, a selection from which are immediately published, as for the general promotion of agriculture.

Premiums for actual experiments and improvements and for the best pieces written on agricultural subjects, are annually given. The fund for these and other necessary expences, is raised by an annual contribution of one dollar. The members are divided into resident and honorary.

#### PLACES OF AMUSEMENT.

From a perusal of the foregoing pages, it will obviously appear, that there is no city better furnished with those institutions, which tend to alleviate the calamities incident to human nature, than Philadelphia; and that the means of improvement in science, Philosophy, and religion, are amply provided. Neither are those amusements wanting which, in large and populous cities, are generally styled polite; of the most remarkable of these we have subjoined a short account.

#### PEALE'S MUSEUM,

South west corner of Third and Lombard Streets.

In this city is a considerable *Museum* of the subjects of natural history, open to every one: An important acquisition, to science and the arts, which is increasing rapidly through the indefatigable and sole efforts of an individual remarkable for his ingenuity and perseverance rather than for pecuniary abilities. It is wonderful that under very discouraging circumstances, he should have built a house one hundred feet long, including grottos, and filled it with some thousands of the most curious and interesting subjects, well arranged in less than eight years. He glows with the generous hope that, hereafter, it will become a great national magazine of information for the benefit of the rising generation and of posterity: and that it may not be lost to *America*, as were all the collections made before his time, by disposing of them to



foreigners, he has assured to the public of this country a preservation of all the subjects of his museum, by obliging himself not to sell or dispose of them without having first obtained the consent of a majority of a number of patriotic gentlemen of science, who by his invitation are formed into a society of visitors and inspectors over his museum. A small sum, 25 cents, is paid for admission, towards the support and increase of the museum.

**BOWEN'S WAX-WORK,**  
Corner of Eighth and High Streets.

This extensive collection of wax-work has for this some time past collected a rotine of fashionable company, and still continues to be the resort of numbers, particularly in the evening, when, it is thought that the figures appear to most advantage. To give a particular description of the different figures would far exceed our limits, and it would be rather difficult to select those which are most deserving of notice. Suffice it to say, that they have an appearance of animation far beyond what can easily be conceived from inanimate figures, and that they are arranged with the utmost taste and judgment. This exhibition which is now well worthy of the attention of the curious still continues to increase.—Price of admission only 25 cents.

**T H E A T R E S.**

We have here two theatres, the one called the old theatre situated in Cedar, between Fourth and Fifth Streets, now open. The other called the new theatre corner of Sixth and Chestnut Streets, which we are informed will be open some time in next September.

**C I R C U S,**

High, near the corner of Twelfth Street.

The public have for this some time past, been much gratified with the performance of Mr Ricketts the celebrated equestrian, whose dexterity in horsemanship far exceeds any thing of the kind hitherto exhibited in America.—To the honor of this gentleman, it ought not to be omitted that he lately gave a benefit for the purpose of raising a fund to buy fuel for the poor during the inclemency of winter.—He has the honour of laying the foundation, and it cannot be doubted that others will contribute to the increase of a fund for so humane a purpose.

There are a number of places of entertainment in the vicinity of the city to which the inhabitants resort in great numbers, particularly during the summer months. Of these the principal are Gray's gardens remarkable on account of its very romantic situation, and Harrowgate for its medicinal waters. The Wigwam, in Sassafras Street, on the banks of Schuylkill, and Lebanon in Cedar, between Tenth and Eleventh Streets, with many



others, are likewise in the most agreeable situations, and in all the most punctual attendance is paid to the company.

#### NEW-YORK STAGES.

THERE are at present four stages ply between this city and New-York, two of which set off at three o'clock in the morning, and arrive at New-York that evening; the one, from James Thompson's, at the Indian Queen, 15, So. Fourth St. the other, from the city tavern, 86, So. Second St. A stage sets off from the George tavern, corner of Second and Mulberry Sts. precisely at half past 8 o'clock in the morning, and on Saturday at 6 o'clock, and arrives at New-York the succeeding day by 1 o'clock. The mail-stage sets off at 1 o'clock, P. M. from Mr Anderson's, at the sign of the sorrel horse, 39, No. Second St. carries only four passengers, and arrives at New-York in 21 hours after its departure. The fare for each passenger in these stages, is four dollars, and four pence per mile for way passengers.—A New-York packet-boat starts from M'Kean & Van Emburgh's wharf, the first wharf below Mulberry St. on every Sunday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, and proceeds to Bordentown or Burlington (each place alternately), from one of which places one or more good carriages start on the succeeding morning for South Amboy, from which port a convenient packet will sail for New-York immediately after their arrival. The fare for each passenger is two dollars.

#### BALTIMORE STAGES.

A stage leaves the George tavern, corner of Second and Mulberry Sts. and another the Indian Queen, 15, So. Fourth St. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, at 9 o'clock. The fare to Baltimore by land is one guinea.

The Baltimore packet sets off from the crooked-billet wharf, between High and Chestnut Sts. every day of the week, Saturday excepted, and proceeds to New-Castle, where a carriage receives the passengers, and carries them to French-Town; from which they proceed by water to Baltimore. The route is most commonly performed in two days.—Each passenger pays two dollars and an half.

#### LANCASTER STAGE.

THE Lancaster stage sets off from John Dunwoody's, at the sign of the spread eagle, in High St. on Tuesdays and Fridays, at half past six in the morning. The fare is three dollars.

#### BETHLEHEM STAGE.

THE Bethlehem stage sets off from Lether's tavern, at the sign of the stage-waggon in Second, between Mulberry and Saffiras Sts. every morning at three o'clock, Sunday excepted—the fare is two dollars.

*Mode of transacting business at the Custom-House of the United States, for the Port of Philadelphia, and extracts from the Revenue Acts, for the direction of Merchants, Masters of Vessels, and others concerned.*

NO goods are to be imported, in any vessel, owned in the whole or in part by citizens, from any foreign port, unless the Master shall have on board a manifest in writing, signed by him, containing the names of the ports or places where such goods were received, and the port where consigned or destined to, and the name and built of the vessel, and true tonnage by register, with the name of the Master and place to which such vessel belongs, and particular account of all the cargo in packages, or loose, with the marks and numbers in words at length, and description of each by usual denominations.

For any goods not included in the manifest as above, the Master is to forfeit a sum equal to their value, unless it is made appear to the Collector, Naval Officer, and Surveyor, or to a Court on trial, that no part of the cargo was unshipped, except what is mentioned in the report, or that the manifest has been lost or mislaid without fraud, or defaced by accident, or incorrect by mistake.

THE Master of any vessel, bound to any port in the United States, on arrival within four leagues of the coast, or within any bays, harbours, ports, rivers, creeks, or inlets thereof, on demand, to produce such manifest to the Officer of the Customs first coming on board, and deliver him a copy thereof subscribed by the Master, and the Officer to certify on the original, that the same was so produced, and a copy delivered him, and the Master to produce the original so certified to the officer first coming on board, on his arrival in the district where the cargo is intended to be landed, and deliver to such officer a copy thereof, to be provided and subscribed by the Master, the delivery of which to be certified by the said Officer on the original manifest, and the original manifest to be delivered afterwards to the Collector.

THE penalty for not producing such manifests and delivering copies thereof, or for not informing such officer of the destination of such vessel, or giving false account of destination, is five hundred dollars for each offence.

ANY vessel within four leagues of the coast, or within the limits of a district, unloading goods, without authority from proper officers, the Master and the Mate forfeit one thousand dollars, and the goods forfeited, except in case of accident, necessity and stress of weather, which shall be proved before the collector.

MASTERS of vessels receiving goods so unloaden (except as before excepted) to forfeit treble value of such goods, and the ship, boat or vessel receiving them are forfeited.

IF any vessel arriving within a district, shall depart, or attempt to depart, from the same (unless to some more interior port, or

by stress of weather) without report made to the collector, the Master forfeits four hundred dollars.

Any vessel arriving from a foreign port, the Master is to report to the collector within twenty-four hours of his arrival, and within forty-eight hours further to report the name, burthen and loading of such ship, whether in packages or loose, and of the marks, numbers and contents of each package, and place or places, person or persons, to or for whom they are respectively consigned or destined, also the places where she took in her loading, what country built, from what foreign port she last sailed, who was Master during the voyage, and who is at the time of the report, and (if a vessel of the United States) who are owners.

MASTERS neglecting to make such reports forfeit 1000 dollars.

SHIPS OF WAR or packets of any Prince or State, and not permitted by such Prince or State, to carry goods in way of trade, are not required to make such report.

MASTERS of vessels, after arrival and entry, may proceed to foreign ports, with goods reported for such foreign port, without paying duties thereon, on giving bond, and bonds are not required when vessels put in in distress.

DUTIES only to be paid where goods are landed (on giving bond if such vessel proceeds to another district.)

COLLECTOR to furnish the Master, bound to another district, with a copy of his report, which he is to shew to the collector of that district, within 24 hours after his arrival, on a penalty of 500 dollars.

OWNERS or consignees of goods imported, are within fifteen days after the Masters report to make entry with the collector of the marks, numbers and contents of each package, or quantity and quality in each bulk, with the neat prime cost thereof, and produce the original invoice, document and bills of loading, and declare all the party knows, on oath or affirmation, and subscribe the same.

SEA-STORIES to be specified by Masters, and excepted from duty, but are not to be landed or sold.

CLOATHS, books, household furniture, tools or implements of trades, or professions of persons arriving in the United States to settle, exempted from duty on due proof.

No goods from foreign port to be unloaden, but between sunrise and sun-set, nor without a permit under penalty of four hundred dollars, disability from holding office for seven years, and being advertised in the gazettes, and forfeiture of goods, and if above the value of four hundred dollars, of vessel and apparel.

GOODS removed before gauged or weighed, without permission, are forfeited.

INSPECTORS and officers of revenue cutters, may go on board, examine and search vessels, have free access to the cabin, and seal packages, and after sun-set, secure hatches and communications.



PERSONS in charge of vessels, for breaking fastenings before sun rise and presence of an officer, forfeit two hundred dollars.

GOODS not entered in fifteen days, to be delivered to the Collector to store and sell, &c. except salt or coal which may remain longer, the owners paying inspectors.

PACKAGES wanting, or goods not agreeing with manifest, the Master forfeits five hundred dollars, unless made appear to satisfaction of principal Officers of customs, or Courts, that no part has been unshipped except in report, or an accident or mistake.

SHIPS arriving in distress to make protest before a Notary, or other person authorized, or before the Collector, within twenty-four hours, and within forty-eight hours to report of vessel and cargo to the Collector, as in other cases. Goods may be stored, and so much as necessary for repairs sold on payment of duties.

DUTIES to be paid before permit unless they exceed fifty dollars, in which case they may be secured by bond, with one or more securities, payable, viz. salt in 9 months, West-India produce (except salt) 4 months, wines 12 months, teas from China 12 months, and if stored, under care of the inspector, 2 years; all other, one half in six months, one quarter in 9 months, and one quarter in 12 months; or the importer may deposit double the value of duties in the goods to secure payment of duties, which on failure of payment are to be sold.



**TEAS** from China may be deposited with the collector, and delivered on payment of duties, for such part as is delivered within eighteen months, and then sold for duties if not paid.

**OFFICERS** may seize within or without their districts; persons resisting or impeding them forfeit four hundred dollars.

**In cases of drawback**, notice to be given to the collector by the exporter, at least 24 hours before shipping the goods, except for distilled spirits, 6 hours notice only is required; all which are to be inspected and shipped in presence of an officer. Drawbacks are allowed at the place of entry only, on all goods exported to any country without the United States, within twelve months, after payment made or security given for the duties inwards, and excepting where the duties do not amount to 20 dollars, and distilled spirits to 100 gallons at least, retaining one per cent of the duties, and half a cent per gallon for the charges of entry, &c.

**BONDS** with one or more sufficient securities to be given, that such goods shall not be reloaded in the United States.

**In case of vessel call away**, or other accident, to produce protest in due form, or in case such protest cannot be had, the oath or affirmation of the exporter, or other proof to the satisfaction of the Collector.

**GOODS** exported for drawback, and reloaded, subject to seizure, together with the vessel, boats, &c. and persons concerned suffer six months imprisonment; but if the voyage is altered, the collector may give permit for reloading.

**SALT FISH AND SALTED PROVISIONS** to be shipped under the same restrictions as in case of drawbacks, and the bounty to be paid without abatement, but no drawbacks, to be allowed, unless it amount to twenty dollars, nor bounty unless to three dollars.

**THE Collector** may give credit on bonds due, for amount of drawbacks, if given by the exporter, being the importer.

**PERSONS** giving or offering a bribe forfeit from two hundred to two thousand dollars.

**CAPTAINS** or owners making false entry forfeit not exceeding one thousand dollars, and suffer not more than twelve months imprisonment.

**No goods** of foreign growth or manufacture, to be brought into the United States unless by sea, and not in vessels under thirty tons, on forfeiture of goods and vessels (except to Louisville on the Ohio) except household furniture and cloathing of persons removing to the United States.

**VESSELS** bound to foreign ports, the Master is to deliver a true manifest on oath and take clearance (but without specifying particulars unless required) under penalty of two hundred dollars.

**All permits** granted by the Collector, for wines and distilled spirits, shall, prior to the landing of such goods, be produced to

the Inspector of the Port, who shall by indorsement signify the same. Wines or spirits landed contrary to the above directions, are subject to forfeiture.

Spirits imported (excepted gin in cases and cordials) in casks under 50 gallons are forfeited, and the vessel also, until the 30th day of April, 1793,—after which no distilled spirits, except arrack and sweet cordials, can be imported in casks or vessels of less capacity than 90 gallons, on pain of forfeiture; as also beer, ale or porter, in casks less than 40 gallons; or if in bottles, in packages less than six dozen, are forfeited, together with the ship or vessel.

Sureties in all bonds given at the Custom-House for duties, shall, in case of insolvency in the principal, have and enjoy like advantages, priority and preference, for recovery of the monies so bonded, out of the estate and effects of such insolvent, as is reserved and secured to the United States by the 44th section of the act for the collection of duties, &c.

No ship or vessel from foreign ports shall be permitted to report, make entry, or break bulk, till the master shall deliver to the post master all letters under his care or within his power, other than such as are directed to the owner or consignee,—the collector to require an oath or affirmation from every master of such delivery.—Masters of vessels to receive two cents for every letter so delivered.

If the foregoing is not strictly complied with, no drawback will be allowed.



*A List of remarkable events which have taken place from the first discovery of America to the present period.*

AMERICA first discovered by Christopher Columbus, a native of Genoa, 1492.

South America discovered by Americus Vesputianus, a native of Florence, from whom that continent took its name, 1497.

North America discovered for Henry VII. by Cabot a native of Bristol, 1499.

Magellan, in the service of Spain, discovers the strait between the continent of South America and Terra del Fuego, which now bears his name, 1518.

On the 13th of July two ships, commissioned by Sir Walter Raleigh, who had obtained a patent from Queen Elizabeth for such lands as he might discover, not belonging to any christian prince, anchor in a harbour seven leagues west of the Roanoke. take possession of the country in a formal manner, and in honour of their virgin queen denominate it Virginia, 1684.

Henry Hudson discovers the river which is now known by his name, and sells his claim to the Dutch, who soon after take possession of the country, and give to that region which now comprehends the states of New-York, New-Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Delaware, the general appellation of the New-Netherlands. New-York was called New Amsterdam, 1608.

About one hundred persons who had fled from religious persecution in Old England, arrive at a place in Massachusetts, which in commemoration of the city in their native land which they had last left, they denominate Plymouth, 1620.

Maryland granted by king Charles to lord Baltimore of Ireland, 1632.

Governor Styvesant surrenders the New Netherlands to colonel Nichols who had been commissioned by king Charles to subdue that country: the country is then called New-York, in honour of his majesty's brother, James duke of York and Albany, 1664.

Lord Berkley and Sir James Carteret purchase of the duke of York that part of his possessions which is now called New-Jersey, and which takes its name from the island of Jersey, where the Carteret family then had and still have a considerable estate, 1665.

South-Carolina began to be settled, lord Clarendon having some time before obtained a patent for that country, 1669.

The celebrated William Penn receives a patent for Pennsylvania, 1681.

The said William Penn purchases of James, duke of York, that part of his possessions which is now called Delaware, 1683.

North Carolina settled by a number of indigent Palatines, 1709.

A number of public spirited gentlemen began to settle Georgia, so called in honour of George the second, 1732.

GEORGE WASHINGTON, the father of his country, and the friend of man. was born in Virginia, the 22d of February, 1732.

The British parliament lay a duty on teas imported into America, which the Americans consider as a grievance, and deny the right of the British parliament to tax them, 1774.

The first general congress meet at Philadelphia, September 5.  
Battle of Lexington, April 19, 1775.

Articles of confederation and perpetual union are agreed on between the American colonies, May 20.

Battle of Bunker's Hill, June 17.

Boston evacuated by the Americans, March 17, 1776.

Congress declare the States of America to be free, sovereign, and independant, July 4.

New-York taken by the British. September 15.

The gallant general Montgomery killed in storming Quebec, September 31.

The American army at the battle of Flat-bush in Long-Island defeated with the loss of 1000 men, August 27, 1776.

Nine hundred Hessians taken by general Washington, December 26, at Trenton.

The British defeated at Princeton with the loss of 300 prisoners. On the side of the Americans, the brave general Mercer was amongst the slain, January 2, 1777.

Battle of Brandywine, in which the Americans lost about 400 prisoners, September 11.

General Howe takes possession of Philadelphia, September 26.

Lieut. general Burgoyne surrenders his army to general Gates at Saratoga, October 17.

Treaty of amity and commerce between the United States and France, concluded, February 6, 1778.

The earl of Carlisle, William Eden, and George Johnston arrive at Philadelphia in the beginning of June as commissioners for restoring peace between Great Britain and America; with whom congress refuse to treat unless their independence should be admitted.

The British evacuate Philadelphia, June 18.

Battle of Monmouth, June 28.

Stoney-point taken by general Wayne, July 16.

The Spaniards join with the French and Americans against Great Britain, June 1779.

Charleston (South Carolina) surrenders to Sir Henry Clinton, May 4, 1780.

The legislature of Massachusetts pass an act for incorporating and establishing a society for the cultivation and promotion of the arts and sciences, May 4.

The winter of 1780 and 1781, remarkable for its uncommon severity so that in January the passage between New-York and Staten Island was practicable for the heaviest cannon.

6000 Troops under the command of count Rochambeau arrive at Rhode Island, July 10.

The American army under general Gates defeated at Cam-  
dan, August 16.

The traitor Arnold deserts to the British, and is by them ap-  
pointed brigadier general, September 24.

The British under colonel Tarlton defeated by general Morgan  
at the Cowpens, January 17, 1781.

The battle of Guilford court house, March 15.

The battle of the Eutaw springs, September 9.

Lord Cornwallis surrenders his whole army consisting of  
7000 men to generals Washington and Rochambeau, October 19.

Holland acknowledges the sovereignty of the United States,  
April 19, 1782.

Sir Guy Carleton arrives at New-York with power to treat  
of peace, May 5.

Treaty of amity and commerce between America and Hol-  
land, October 8.

Definitive treaty of peace between the United States and Great  
Britain ratified, September 3, 1783.

The British evacuate New-York, November 25.

September 17, 1787. The convention which had for some time  
past been assembled at Philadelphia report to the consideration of  
the citizens of America the new constitution, which was ratified  
by the different states in the following order.
