This exhibit analyzes the various rates and routes for mail from the USA to Australia until 1891.

During the 1850s Australian gold-rush, Adams Express had offices in Sydney and Melbourne. Letter from J. Hawes, asking Carrington to send Australian newspapers to him in San Francisco, since Hawes had acquired Gregory's Australian Express.

45¢ rate is the sum of 5¢ US internal, 16¢ transatlantic ship, and 24¢ (12d) UK to Australia postage by contract ship. Adelaide departed Plymouth on 18 December but returned in "leaky condition", then sailed again on 2 January 1853.

Starnes records the 45 cent packet rate as the "Via Plymouth" rate, although some ships departed from Southampton, not Plymouth. Tasmania had ended its ship letter charge on arriving mail by 1854.

37¢ rate is the sum of 5¢ US internal, 16¢ transatlantic ship, and 16¢ (8d) UK to Australia postage by private ship. *Only recorded 37 cent rate cover from US used during the correct period.* Other recorded 37 cent rate covers are overpaid 33 cent rates (see below).

Adams Express was in financial difficulty so cover was mailed. The 37 cent rate period ended with the establishment of the 6d Empire Rate between England and Australia on 1 October 1854 - the "28" credit to England confirms this cover is an overpaid 33¢ rate - see article by Winter and Forster in Nov 1990 Chronicle.

# 5 CENT DIRECT RATE VIA ATLANTIC - 10 CENT DIRECT RATE VIA PACIFIC



The few private direct ship sailings usually meant slow transit times.

Starnes lists the 10 cent private ship rate from San Francisco from April 1855 until August 1863. There were few sailings and very few covers have survived.

# 33 CENT EASTERN RATE AND 38 CENT WESTERN RATE VIA ENGLAND

One of two recorded Civil War patriotic envelopes used to Australia.

5¢ US internal plus 16¢ transatlantic ship plus 12¢ (6d) empire rate from UK to Australia - Starnes calls this the 33¢ Southampton rate although some 1850s sailings departed from other ports. Route went through the Straits of Gibraltar to Suez.

Central overland stage route to NY, 15 Mar 1862, Cunard Canada

> London 1 April 1862, 28¢ credit to England

P&O via Suez, Bombay to Sydney NSW

The west-coast distance differential was abolished on 30 June 1863, after which date the west-coast rate to Australia via England was reduced to 33 cents. This cover may to be the only surviving example of the 38 cent west-coast rate.

# 39 AND 45 CENT RATES VIA ENGLAND AND MARSEILLES

London 19 July 1865, 18 cent credit

Via Calais, Marseilles and Suez

P&O Bombay to Melbourne 19 Sep 1865



From 1857, France charged 3d (6 cents) per quarter ounce on covers taking their railroad between Calais to Marseilles - Routing was four or five days faster than via Southampton.

#### \$1.80 RATE VIA ENGLAND AND MARSEILLES

\$1.80 paid for a two ounce letter sent via Marseilles. The 142 credit mark on the below cover indicates that the post office rated it at 1½ ounces, with a French charge of 30 cents.

Starnes lists a 30 cent French Mail rate to Australia from 1857 to 1870, but very few examples are recorded. Allan Line Packets were treated as American Packets by the USA, but British Packets by France, which explains the French "BR" handstamp.

Sender paid the 30 cent French Mail rate but the "28" credit marking to England indicates the cover was treated as being fully paid for the British rate via Southampton..

#### 22 CENT RATE VIA PANAMA

The New Zealand Line between Panama and Sydney operated from 1866-68. The 22 cent rate from the USA was 10 cents to Panama City plus 12 cents trans-Pacific.



The colony of Victoria did not provide financial support to the Panama Line, so mail to that colony was charged 6d postage due. Inexplicably the upper cover was not charged.

## 22 CENT RATE VIA SOUTHAMPTON

In January 1868 the rate from USA to England was lowered to 12 cents. The USA via Southampton rate to Australia was 12 cents transatlantic plus 12 cents (6d) UK to Australia, less the 2 cent British internal rate which was included in both 12 cent segments.

1870 rate reduction to 6 cents on transatlantic mail to England resulted in a 16 cent via Southampton rate to Australia - 6 cents transatlantic plus 12 cents (6d) England to Australia, less the 2 cent British internal charge included in both segments.

Long way around from San Francisco - both covers used during the 1872-1873 period when no contractor could be found to execute direct contract sailings from San Francisco.

New Zealand signed a postal treaty with the USA in 1870 and direct steamship service began from San Francisco to the Australian Colonies. 12¢ treaty rate applied from 1870, although Australian Colonies were slow to sign postal treaties (NSW 1874, Queensland 1876, Victoria 1878 and Tasmania 1886). Australian Colonies did not levy incoming charges.



## 15 Cent GPU Rate Via Southampton (1875-1878)

New York 19 May 1877, 15¢ paid, 50 centimes h/s (credit to UK of 10¢ per GPU treaty)

London 30 May 1877

Via Southampton and Suez per P&O steamers

> Adelaide SA 20 July 1877



1875 GPU Treaty lowered the via Southampton rate from 16 to 15 cents. Debits and credits were calculated in French centimes.

# 12 Cent GPU Rate Via Brindisi (1885-91)



Port Chester New York 15 Jan 1890, "Via Europe"

New York 18 Jan 1890, 50 centimes credit to UK

Via London, Brindisi Italy and Suez

Melbourne 4 March 1890

Inglewood Victoria 5 March 1890

The 12 cent rate via Brindisi was operational from August 1885 to Oct 1891 (UPU). By this date all mail sent via Europe went by rail to the Italian ports of Brindisi or Naples - both of which provided a shorter Mediterranean sea-link to Alexandria.
