

### **British Service**

Route 1. From New York, Boston or Portland. Single rate credit 12¢ (prepaid) or debit 3¢ (unpaid)

Allan Line	April 25, 1857	December 17, 1859	ET. UNIS SERV. BRIT. CALAIS ET. UNIS. SERV. BR. HAVRE

notes: Sailings from Boston or New York by Cunard Line and from Portland by Allan Line. Not all Allan Line sailings were under British service after January 1859 (see also routes 4 and 5). Most British service mail carried via Calais and sorted on the "ambulant" between Calais and Paris (A.C. markings).



### **British Service**

**Route 2.** From New York or Boston. Single rate credit 12¢ (prepaid) or debit 3¢ (unpaid)

Cunard Line	November 9, 1859	December 25, 1867	ET. UNIS SERV. BR. A.C. ET. UNIS SERV. BRIT. CALAIS ET. UNIS. SERV. BR. HAVRE
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notes: Sailings from Boston or New York by Cunard Line. Queenstown gradually replaced Liverpool as the first port of arrival and those town alternated during the transition period (see also route 1).



### **British Service**

**Route 3.** From New York or Boston via Galway. Single rate credit 12¢ (prepaid) or debit 3¢ (unpaid)

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notes: Sailings from Boston or New York. Not all sailings carried mail for France.



# Route 4. From Portland to Londonderry. Single rate credit 12¢ (prepaid) or debit 3¢ (unpaid) Allan Line April 27, 1861 December 25, 1869 ET. UNIS SERV. BR. A.C. ET. UNIS SERV. BR. T. CALAIS ET. UNIS SERV. BR. HAVRE notes: (See also listings under routes 1, 5 and 8).




# American Packet via England

**Route 5.** From New York or Portland. Single rate credit 6¢ (prepaid) or debit 9¢ (unpaid)

Allan Line	January 1859	December 17, 1859	ETATS-UNIS SERV. AM. CALAIS

notes: The Collins Line ceased operations after the January 16, 1858 trip while the other lines changed their routes to via Southampton rather than Liverpool (see routes 7 and 8). Allan Line was not under American contract for all trips.



# American Packet via England

Route 6. From New York to Southampton. Single rate credit 6¢ (prepaid) or debit 9¢ (unpaid)

notes: The two major German steamship lines began carrying American contract mail via Southampton in 1868. HAPAG switched their route to Plymouth and Cherbourg in April 1869 (see route 10).



# American Packet via England

**Route 7.** New York to Queenstown, via England. Single rate credit 6¢ (prepaid) or debit 9¢ (unpaid)

Cunard Line	January 1, 1868	December 29, 1869	ETATS-UNIS SERV. AM. CALAIS ET. UNIS. SERV. AM. V.A. HAVRE

notes: After January 1868 Cunard sailed under American contract and used only the port of New York for departures. The Inman Line changed their route to Queenstown with September 25, 1858 voyage.



### American Packet via England

Route 8. From Portland to Ireland, via England to Calais. Single rate credit 6¢ (prepaid) or debit 9¢ (unpaid)

Allan Line	June 23, 1860	March 31, 1861	ET. UNIS SERV. AM. A.C. ETATS-UNIS SERV. AM. CALAIS
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notes: The Allan Line changed their route in June 1860 to stop in Londonderry rather than Liverpool. After carriage across England, the mails were landed at Calais.

notes: From April 1869 HAPAG steamers began carrying direct American packet mail in closed bags to Cherbourg.			



### **American Packet Direct**

Route 11. From New York via Falmouth to Havre. Single rate credit 3¢ (prepaid) or debit 12¢ (unpaid)

Havre Line November 25, 1865 October 26, 1867 ET. UNIS. SERV. AM. D. HAVRE

notes: In 1865 the Havre Line resumed trips to France but changed the intermediate port of call from Southampton to Falmouth.



### French Packet

Route 12. From New York direct to Havre. Single rate credit 12¢ (prepaid) or debit 3¢ (unpaid)

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notes: The French Line commenced operations in 1864 with a subsidy from France. The route was directly to Havre until rail connections were completed to Brest in 1865 when that stop was added. A few trips in 1865 did not include the Brest stop which was made constant after June 2, 1865 New York departure. The "2 LE HAVRE 2" markings applied in Paris. In addition to the above, name of paquebots markings are reported from the ships *Washington*, *Lafayette* and *Europe*.



### **French Packet**

**Route 13.** From New York to Brest and Havre. Single rate credit 12¢ (prepaid) or debit 3¢ (unpaid)

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notes: The French Line was designated "Ligne H" in March 1866 and four sets of devices numbered 1 to 4 were issued. Prior to that date, mail was marked with either the Brest datestamp applied in Paris or the Le Havre datestamp. After Line H designation, mail was sorted onboard by a French postal agent and postmark dates correspond to New York departure dates. Most mails were off-loaded at Brest and handled by rail to Paris. The "2 BREST 2" and "2 LE HAVRE 2" markings were applied in Paris
