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INTRODUCTION

February 1st 1891 marked the introduction of the Railway Letter Service, an important new postal service with specially designed stamps issued by the railway companies who had entered into agreement with the Post Office. This made official the practice of sending urgent letters by rail (previously a contravention of the Post Office monopoly) and marked the start of a real express letter service which the Post Office Express Service could not match. Apart from some notable exceptions these stamps were of a standard design, but the different printers and printings have long made them a source of interest to philatelists.

The first priced catalogue of Railway Letter Stamps was produced in the 1900s by H. L`Estrange Ewen. Ewen was one of the pioneer collectors and dealers at a time when collecting of these stamps was reaching a peak. His work culminated in a two part priced catalogue issued in 1905/06 which recorded stamps issued up to that time. Ewen had earlier published his `History of Railway Letter Stamps' in 1901 and this massive work remains the most valuable reference to date.

After the First World War interest in these stamps waned although there were still a few enthusiastic collectors. The stamps continued to be issued, with rate changes in the 1920s necessitating many new stamps. Some companies used parcel or newspaper stamps in place of the standard letter fee stamp. Between 1946 and 1958 S.R. Turner produced a new unpriced catalogue in four parts covering the period 1891/1941 and this remained the only additional reference until Captain Harold Jackson published his `The Railway and Airway Letter Stamps of the British Isles 1891 - 1971' in 1979. Publication coincided with a renewed interest and included all issued up to 1971 apart from stamps issued by the railway preservation societies. It also included the Airway letter stamps. Jackson's catalogue was a landmark and stimulated a renewed interest. In his introduction he commented:

"With great reluctance I have yielded to pressure to price the issues. My reluctance has several reasons. One is that a priced catalogue is a dated catalogue and this is especially borne out at the present time, where the currency is being rapidly deflated whilst interest in these stamps is rapidly increasing."

The question of pricing remains a problem and perhaps the only criticism of Jackson's work is that the pricing in many cases fails to reflect the relative scarcity of the stamps. It is now twenty years since publication and as interest in the stamps has continued to grow it seems time for a new catalogue with a more accurate pricing structure.

The present catalogue departs from Jackson's work in two major ways. Details of the railway companies are now given, with many maps. The newspaper and parcel stamps used as letter fee stamps are omitted - these will be included in the forthcoming Catalogue of the Railway Newspaper and Parcel Stamps of the British Isles. The Airway letter stamps are also omitted as these are listed elsewhere. Mention should be made of the railway letter stamps issued by the preserved railways, starting with those of the Tallylyn Railway in 1956. Although of great interest to collectors these are mainly philatelic and have been very adequately catalogued first by David Potter and more recently by Neill Oakley.

Jackson concluded his introduction with a tribute:

"A tribute should be paid to four devoted collectors of these stamps, for, without their accumulations, most of the stamps catalogued here would have disappeared without record. They are H. L. Estrange Ewen who created his `fifth column' to beat the Railway Companies' ban on the sale of these letter stamps to collectors and dealers. A .Wilson, who before, during and after the First World War spent his holidays cycling round the British Isles posting letters to himself and trying to buy these stamps at every station; and F.C.S. Gardener and J.E. Moss who were posting letters to themselves at railway stations when everyone else was involved in the Second World War."

To those names should be added Harold T. Jackson and I acknowledge the debt owed to him for his enthusiasm in collecting and recording these issues. His catalogue remains a valuable reference.

My grateful thanks to Margaret and Edwin Craggs for their encouragement in the production of this catalogue and their sterling work at Moorside Publishing - scanning the stamps and typesetting the whole book, and to Edwin for helping to research the railways and maps.

A NOTE ON PRICING

This is based on many years experience collecting these stamps, the study of numerous price lists and auction catalogues, as well as an examination of most of the large collections available for study.

Unused prices are for examples in good condition, used for an average example. Many used stamps were cancelled by pen or crayon and clear handstamps (of which many varieties are recorded) command a premium in most cases. Prices on cover are not included in this catalogue.

Where no price is indicated it is for one of the following reasons:

1. No copy is known to exist in that state.

2. Very few copies are known to exist

HISTORY OF THE RAILWAY LETTER POST.

Soon after the introduction of railways in the 19th century, mail began to be carried by rail. After the introduction of the uniform penny post in May 1840 the railways soon began to play their part in the speedier delivery of correspondence; it soon became obvious that an even greater advantage could be obtained by handing a letter to the guard of a train for posting or collection at the nearest Station to the addressee. This possibility became even more attractive to those whose letters had missed the last post or needed to be despatched on a day when there was no collection.

The Post Office very soon objected to this breach of their monopoly over the conveyance of letters, but the carriage of parcels lay outside this monopoly and someone soon discovered that if a letter was tied with string it then became a 'parcel' and so could be legally carried by rail. Examples of these 'string' letters exist from the 1840s and continued to be sent even after the introduction of the official railway letter service. There was nothing the Post Office could do to prevent this breach of their monopoly.

Newspapers could be sent post free in virtue of the newspaper tax, but reporters and editors clearly had need for a real express service and used the railways. Around the time of the abolition of the newspaper tax in 1855 the Midland Railway issued a series of stamps inscribed PREPAID PARCEL OR NEWSLETTER enabling those newspapers and news correspondence to travel more speedily by rail. Other companies soon followed suit, and later special stamps were issued for the news correspondence.

As early as 1866 the *Stamp Collector* magazine quoted an article advocating the issue of special stamps for the carriage of letters by train, but the idea was not taken up by the Post Office.

The more immediate cause of the introduction of the Railway Letter Post was the establishment of the Court Bureau in 1889. London then had no Sunday post collections and the Bureau collected letters from hotels, clubs and private homes and posted them either at the main railway termini (generally for carriage by T.P.O.) or at the nearest point outside the London area. Special stamps were issued for this service from 1890 until it was wound up on the introduction of the Railway Letter Post in 1891.

The growing infringements of the Post Office monopoly presented the Postmaster General with a dilemma which he decided to resolve by joining with the railway companies. A proposition for a Railway Letter Post was presented to the Conference of Railway General Managers meeting at the Railway Clearing House on 9th May 1889.

In the course of the discussions at the Railway Clearing House it was decided that the Post Office would prepare special stamps with a face value of 3d. These would be supplied to the railway companies at 1d each leaving them with 2d for the cost of their participation in the service.

De La Rue and Co., who printed the Post Office stamps were instructed to prepare a design for these stamps. Four essays were prepared and presented on 17th February 1890. These were inscribed POSTAGE AND RAILWAY SERVICE. The design was not approved and amended designs were submitted on 14th April 1890. The inscription now read RAILWAY LETTER SERVICE or RAILWAY LETTER POSTAGE.

Objections were received from the London and North Western Railway and another design was prepared and submitted on 3rd July 1890. This had L.N.W. RY. Co. at the top and a control number at the bottom. The wording was again RAILWAY LETTER POSTAGE. De La Rue also overprinted 3d postage stamps with the words RAILWAY LETTER POSTAGE. This was intended as a provisional issue of combined stamps pending the preparation of plates for distinctive stamps. A requisition was sent to the printers in July 1890. In August the Post Office discovered that the combined stamps could not be issued without the authority of an Act of Parliament and in September the scheme was abandoned.

The Post Office then prepared a design which each railway company could copy. The design itself has not survived, but it was similar to the first issue of the North Eastern Railway letter stamps, and red in colour. The wording was now RAILWAY LETTER POST with an inscription round the shield reading TO BE USED ONLY FOR LETTERS BEARING A POSTAGE STAMP.

The design was approved during a meeting at the Railway Clearing House in November 1890, but then the Post Office had second thoughts on the wording. An amended design was produced with the fictitious title BENGAL AND NORTH WESTERN RAILWAY - the inscription round the shield now read FEE FOR THE CONVEYANCE OF A SINGLE POST LETTER BY RAILWAY, and the inscription RAILWAY LETTER POST had been omitted.

In an agreement drawn up between the Postmaster General and the railway companies, it was finally agreed that the arrangement for conveyance of single post letters by railway would come into operation on 1st February 1891. In the articles of agreement it was stated that "The Railway Letter Posts will commence on 1st February 1891, for all companies, for letters addressed to a place within the United Kingdom, and not exceeding 1oz in weight. Transmission is to be by trains or steamships".

Letters had to bear one or more postage stamps "of the aggregate value of one penny" and the railway official receiving the letter was to cancel the stamps by writing in ink across them. The sender was to pay the railway company 2d and no company was to charge less, with no further payment being made by the Postmaster General.

A public notice was issued - an example of the Midland Railway edition is reproduced in this book - and the service commenced on 1st February 1891, although a Midland Railway cover is known dated 31st January 1891.

The first issue of railway letter stamps of the North Eastern Railway in February 1891 were in red and had the rejected wording of December 1890 (see page 58) but this was quickly suppressed by the Post Office and a stamp with the correct wording issued in March 1891.

Stamps valued 2d continued to be issued by various companies until January 1920 when the rate for railway letters increased to 3d. In 1920 the rate became 4d, but this was reduced to 3d again in 1938. Most stamps adhered to the general pattern, but there were exceptions, notably the second issue of the Londonderry and Lough Swilly Railway Company, the Lynton and Barnstaple Railway and a few other companies. Generally stamps were green, but red and blue stamps were also issued.

Rate changes necessitated surcharges which were produced in manuscript, by handstamp or by overprinting. Some surcharges were produced by Mr.A.Wilson of Manchester who travelled around the country collecting the stamps and posting letters to himself. Wilson didn't like manuscript surcharges and carried his own types for handstamping the surcharge.

From October 1920 the Post Office gave general permission for the use of parcel stamps on railway letters. In fact this was only confirmation of a practice which had become widespread and was tolerated by the Post Office. Earlier in the century Ewen had protested to the Post Office about the practice but no action was taken.

The 1923 grouping of the railways necessitated more changes. New stamps were issued and provisional overprints used. Gradually however, the companies began to give up using special railway letter stamps and by the outbreak of the second world war parcel stamps were in general use with very few companies still issuing specific letter fee stamps. One of the last issues was that of the Shropshire and Montgomeryshire Railway in 1940.

In 1933 the GWR had started an Air Service which carried railway letters - newspaper stamps were used at first and then a special Air Mail stamp was issued. This is listed in the Catalogue of Airways Stamps.

CONVEYANCE OF SINGLE POST LETTERS BY RAILWAY.

Arrangements have been made with the Post Office for the conveyance of single letters by Railway on the terms and under the conditions embodied in the following public notice, such arrangements to apply to all the lines of the Companies included in the Schedule of Railway Companies given in the notice, and to all lines owned, leased, or worked by them:-

PUBLIC NOTICE ISSUED BY THE POSTMASTER GENERAL.

CONVEYANCE OF SINGLE POST LETTERS BY RAILWAY.

On and from the 1st February,1891, certain Railway Companies which have entered into an agreement for the purpose with the Postmaster-General (see list below), will accept and convey by the next available train or steamship, **Single Inland Post Letters**, **not exceeding one ounce in weight**, either to be called for at the station of address, or to be transferred there to the nearest Post Office Letter Box, for delivery by Postman, under the conditions and regulations set forth below:-

METHOD OF POSTING.

1. Every letter intended for transmission as a Railway Letter must be taken to a Passenger Station of the Railway Company over whose line it is to be sent and tendered during such hours as the Station is open to the public, to a servant of the Railway Company in the Parcel Booking Office, or, if that Office be closed, in the Passenger Booking Office. No such letter can be accepted at a Post Office, or by an Officer of the Post Office.

POSTAGE.

2. Upon every Railway Letter a fee of 2d. in addition to postage at the ordinary rate of 1d. for a Letter not exceeding one ounce, will be charged. The total charge of 3d. will defray the whole cost of transmission. No servant of a Railway Company will be entitled to make a further charge on the delivery of a Railway Letter, not any servant of the Post Office, unless it should be discovered to have been accepted contrary to the regulations of the Post Office.

PAYMENT OF POSTAGE.

3. Before a Railway Letter can be accepted by a servant of a Railway Company, the sender must affix to the cover in the same way as to an ordinary post letter, a postage stamp (or stamps) of the value of 1d. which should, on acceptance of the letter, be obliterated by the railway servant, and must in addition pay to such servant the sum of 2d in cash, no more and no less. The railway servant will affix and obliterate an Adhesive Label issued by the Railway Company. This label will simply indicate that the sum of 2d. has been paid to the Railway Company.

LETTERS AND ARTICLES EXCLUDED FROM TRANSMISSION.

- 4. No Letter may be accepted for transmission as a Railway Letter which either -
 - (a) Exceeds one ounce in weight; or is,
 - (b) Addressed to a Foreign Country, or to a Colony, or British Possession; or which
 - (c) From any words or marks thereon appears to be intended for Registration; or which
- (d) Contains or appears to contain a Watch, Coin, or Jewellery, or any article or thing which, if sent by Post Unregistered, would be subjected to Registration by the Post Office; or which
- (e) Contains or appears to contain any article or thing which may not, under the regulations for the time being, be sent by the Inland Letter Post. (See Post Office Guide, p. 16, par.1.)

TREATMENT OF SUCH LETTER, IF ACCEPTED IN ERROR.

- 5. (a) Any Railway Letter found by an Officer of the Post Office to have been accepted contrary to Rule 4(a) will be charged with double the deficient postage at the Inland Letter Rate, as if it were an Ordinary Inland Letter prepaid 1d. only, and exceeding 1 oz in weight. Similarly, any Railway Letter found by an Officer of the Post Office to have been accepted contrary to Rules 4(c) and 4(d) will be charged with a fee of 8d.
- (b) Any Railway Letter accepted contrary to Rules 4(b) and (e) will be handed to an Officer of the Post Office, and will be dealt with in such manner as the Postmaster-General may direct.

DESPATCH.

6. A Railway Letter will be forwarded, and afterwards passed on by each Company in succession (if the case requires it) by the next available Train or Steamship to the Station of address, whether such Station be on the Line of the Company by which the letter has been accepted, or on the Line of any other Company party to this arrangement. For example, a letter handed in at Watford Station for Barrow-in-Furness Station would be transferred from the London and North Western Line to the Furness Line at Carnforth.

ADDRESS AND DELIVERY.

7. (a) A Railway Letter can either be addressed to a Passenger Station to be called for (see example (b)), or to the actual residence of the addressee, with the addition of the name of the Railway Station to which it is to be transmitted (See example (c)). A letter addressed as in example (b) will be retained at the Station of address for a period not exceeding seven days from the date of arrival. In order to obtain delivery, the addressee or his agent must apply for it at the Parcel Booking Office, or, if that Office be closed, at the Passenger Booking Office during such hours as the station is open to the public. A letter addressed as in example (c) will be transferred to the Post Office receptacle nearest to the station of address for delivery in due course of post by the Post Office. Any letter not plainly addressed to a station to be called for, will be so transferred to the post.

LETTERS NOT CALLED FOR.

8. Any Railway Letter Addressed to a Station to be called for, and not called for within seven days from the date of arrival, will be handed over to the Post Office for disposal, in the same way as an ordinary undelivered Inland Letter.

INFORMATION.

9. All information as to arrangements for accepting and forwarding Railway Letters must be obtained locally from the officers of the Railway Company or Companies concerned. While, however, the Railway Companies' Officers will advise the sender of a Railway Letter to the best of their power, the latter should himself discover whether he will gain or lose by sending his letter specially by railway rather than in ordinary course of post: and should clearly understand that neither the Railway Companies nor the Postmaster-General can accept responsibility for any information given on this subject.

NON-LIABILITY OF RAILWAY COMPANIES.

10. Letters posted under the provisions of this notice will, with regard to security and compensation for loss or otherwise, be deemed to be in all respects, Letters sent by post. The Railway Companies in carrying such Letters will act and will be deemed to act solely as agents and at the sole risk and responsibility of the Postmaster-General, but the Companies will take all reasonable care for the security of the Letters while under their charge.

APPLICATION OF ORDINARY POSTAL RULES.

11. Save where repugnant to the preceding rules the ordinary conditions and regulations of the Post Office will apply to Railway Letters and matters connected therewith.

DEFINITIONS.

- 12. (a) A "Railway Letter" is a letter or packet transmitted or intended to be transmitted under the provisions above set forth.

 (b) The Term "Inland" when applied to a Letter, means posted in the United Kingdom and addressed to a place in the United Kingdom.
 - (c) The term "United Kingdom" includes the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man.

N.B. - The public are reminded that, save in the case of a letter exempted from the exclusive privilege of the Postmaster-General (see Post Office Guide, P. 30, Par. 28), no letter can legally be sent by Railway otherwise than in Her Majesty's mails, or in the manner above described. Any person who sends or conveys, or causes to be sent or conveyed, otherwise than by the Post a letter not so exempted, or any person who performs otherwise than by the Post any services incidental to the conveying of letters from place to place, is liable by statute to heavy penalties.

One or more copies of this Public Notice are sent you herewith, which must be posted up in a conspicuous position in the Booking Office, or in the Booking Office and Parcels Office both, where these offices are separate from each other, and where the Notice must be exhibited permanently.

You will observe from this Public Notice-

JOHN NOBLE, GENERAL MANAGER, DERBY.

- (a) That single letters to be forwarded by Railway under this arrangement must be taken to the Station by the sender, and presented at the Parcels Office, or, if that be closed, at the Passenger Booking Office.
- (b) Each letter must bear ordinary postage stamp or stamps of the value of one penny which must be affixed by the sender, and before any letter so stamped can be accepted by the servant of the Railway Company the sender must, in addition, pay to him the sum of two pence in cash, no more and no less. This two pence represents the value of the Railway label *which the Railway servant must himself affix* alongside the postage stamp or stamps, *and obliterate both* by marking a conspicuous cross on the face of both stamp and label with pen and ink.
 - (c) Letters exceeding one ounce in weight must not be accepted for conveyance by Railway.

A supply of the Railway labels will be sent you from this Office, and application must be made to me for further supplies as required.

The postage stamp or stamps of the value of one penny and the Midland Railway labels combined will frank a letter not exceeding one ounce to any Station on any of the Railways enumerated in the Public Notice; and in like manner the labels of the Companies enumerated affixed to a letter bearing postage stamp or stamps of the value of one penny will frank a letter from any Station on any of the Railways enumerated in the Public Notice to your Station.

All letters conveyed under this arrangement must be entered on parcels waybill with the words "Postal Letter" written through the money column, no charge being inserted therein.

The receipts from the sale of the Railway labels must be accounted for as Parcels Extras.

You are requested to read the public notice carefully, and make yourself acquainted with all its provisions, and see that you act carefully up to them as regards the transmission, treatment, despatch, and delivery of all letters that may pass through your Station in connection with this arrangement.

In case a letter addressed to a place on a Railway not included in the list of Railways above mentioned should be inadvertently or by mistake accepted at the forwarding Station it must be carried by Railway to the nearest point of Junction with such outside Railway, and then posted. Letters which require to be conveyed by the vessels of independent Steam Ship Companies, to read destination, must be dealt with in a similar manner.

In cases where letters are tendered at forwarding Stations by the public under a misapprehension the Officer to whom the letter is tendered must suggest to the Sender the proper Station to which it should be taken; as for example in the case of a letter taken by mistake to St.Pancras for Brighton, or to Leeds (Mid.) for Brighouse; to Bath (Mid.) for Cirencester; or to Sheffield (Mid.) for Grimsby. If the suggestion be not adopted the letter may be accepted and despatched by the best route possible under the circumstances.





CENTRAL WALES AND CARMARTHEN JUNCTION RAILWAY

The 13½ mile branch from Llandilo Junction opened by the Llanelly Company, for freight on 14 November 1864 and for passengers on 1 June 1865. A clause in the Company's lease with the London & North Western Railway in which the latter had acquired running rights over the branch, was contested. The result was that the House of Lords ruled that the branch, along with the section from Swansea Victoria to Pontarddulais should constitute a separate company, even though there was a 12 mile distance between Pontarddulais and Llandilo Bridge owned by the Llanelly Company. The new company which included the Llanmorlais branch was known as the Swansea & Carmerthen Railway. The L.N.W.R. obtained permission to work the branch from 1 July 1871, but the Llanelly Company operated the local trains. The L.N.W.R. obtained permission to work its own trains over the line from 1 February 1872.


After the L.N.W.R. took over the Llanmorlais branch in 1873 the remaining section of the Swansea and Carmarthen was re-named Central Wales & Carmarthen Junction Railway. The L.N.W.R. acquired the railway in 1891.

GREAT CENTRAL RAILWAY

The Great Central Railway was mainly a cross country system between the East Coast Ports and the West Yorkshire and East Lancashire industrial areas. The title Great Central Railway was introduced in 1897, by which time the Railway had become amalgamated with the Manchester Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway, which included Grimsby Docks. The Railway gained access to the Great Northern Railways East Coast Main Line at Retford and thereby to London. The agreement for this joint running became known as 'The Fifty Years Agreement ' of 1858. One result of this agreement was the consolidation of several local railways to form 'The Cheshire Lines' controlled jointly by the Great Central and Great Northern Companies. In 1867 the Midland Railway became the third partner in what became known as 'The Cheshire Lines Committee '. The Great Central had planned an independent route south for many years and powers were obtained in 1892 for a new line via Annesley, Nottingham, Loughborough, Leicester, Woodford, Hinton and Brackley joining the Metropolitan Railway at Quainton Road with running powers to Harrow via additional new tracks to Marleybone. The Great Central and Great Western joined forces to build a new line south via Neasden, High Wycombe and Princes Riseborough which came into use on 2nd April 1906. The Railway owned 629 route miles, leased 76 and a further 73 miles were jointly owned. Vast numbers of passengers and tons of freight were moved every day by this very busy railway and its Docks and Shipping arm.



GREAT EASTERN RAILWAY

The Great Eastern Railway was an amalgamation of many companies, including the Eastern Counties Railway, Northern and Eastern, Eastern Union, Norfolk, East Suffolk &c. The title Great Eastern was adopted in 1862. The original London terminus was at Shoreditch with Liverpool Street being opened to all traffic on 1 November 1875.

By means of the Great Northern and Great Eastern Joint line, and the Great Northern and North Eastern Railways through Great Eastern trains ran as far north as York, and the Great Central line to Chesterfield, Sheffield &c. Total route mileage was 1,107 with a further 86 miles worked jointly or leased.





GREAT NORTHERN RAILWAY

The Great Northern Railway is an amalgamation of two rival schemes - the London and York and the Direct Northern. Both started in 1844 and at first fought fiercely between themselves. Agreement was eventually reached and the amalgamation resulted. The Act of Incorporation was obtained in the year 1846 and the main line was opened throughout in 1850, after which date the Great Northern ranked as one of the principal main lines to the north.

The Great Northern was the southern partner in the triple alliance constituting the East Coast route to Scotland, and was also associated with the North Eastern for other services in which the North British was not concerned. It provided the principal route between London and Peterborough, Grantham, Doncaster, York, Lincoln, Boston, Wakefield, Hull, Grimsby and many other towns. The East Coast north of York was also, broadly speaking, almost exclusively served by the line as was Lincolnshire and the Yorkshire coast.

GREAT WESTERN RAILWAY

One of the leading railway companies and the longest mileage of all. In the early years it was associated with many magnificent engineering achievements and some of the countries best known express trains to the south west, Wales and the midlands. The G.W.R. was incorporated in 1835 for a railway from London to Bristol. With various amalgamations over the years the G.W.R. covered a huge part of the country. Originally much of the system was laid to `Broad Gauge' of 7 feet and one quarter of an inch, with some laid to mixed gauge of four feet, eight and one half inch as well. Considerable problems of through running to other parts of the Country prompted changing to what has since been standard at four feet eight and one half inch on 21st and 22nd May 1892. The Company owned 2,681 route miles and 340 joint miles.

LONDON & NORTH EASTERN RAILWAY

After the first World War the Government decided the time was right to amalgamate most of the many railway companies into more workable larger units. After considerable debate the Railways Act of 1921 was given the Kings Assent. It took effect on 1st January 1923. The constituent companies for the East Coast Group were; the Great Central, the Great Eastern, the Great Northern, the North British, the North Eastern, (the largest constituent company), the Hull & Barnsley, the Great North of Scotland, the East & West Yorkshire Union, the Mid Suffolk Light Railway and a further twenty four small companies. The L.N.E.R. also had part interest in some jointly owned railways, notably the Midland & Great Northern and the Cheshire Lines Committee.

The Backbone of the system was the East Coast main line between London and Scotland. Other routes included the high density suburban trains around London, and services in the remote Scottish highlands.



The famous Liverpool & Manchester and the first main line from London - the London & Birmingham, which earned the engineer Robert Stephenson his fame. The London terminus was Euston. The title London & North Western Railway was assumed by Act of Parliament in 1846 when the above railways, The Grand Junction and the Manchester & Birmingham Railways were amalgamated. 





LONDON PASSENGER TRANSPORT BOARD

Established in 1933, the London Passenger Transport Board was entrusted with a complete monopoly of both road and rail passenger transport in the London area, excluding only the main-line railways. Under the Transport Act of 1947 the railways were compulsorily purchased by the state which meant that the London Passenger Transport Board ceased to exist from midnight on 31 December 1947.





METROPOLITAN RAILWAY

The Metropolitan Railway was formed to alleviate congestion on the streets of London and an Act of Parliament obtained in 1853 to construct the first London Underground Railway, although the Act only authorised the building of a section between Edgware Road and Battle Bridge.

The Railway opened on the 10th January 1863 using conventional steam locomotives. Smoke vents were constructed into the streets above, but these were prone to sudden belchings of steam vapour which startled the passing horses - Condensing locomotives were soon to be brought into use.

The Metropolitan carried $9\frac{1}{2}$ million passengers in its first year, increasing to 28 million by 1868. The Railway gradually grew in size until it became 65 route miles in length with 34 stations.



MIDLAND RAILWAY

One of the most important railways, but for many years a provincial undertaking, being dependent for it's London connection at first on the London & North Western and later on the Great Northern Railway. In 1862 an extension from Bedford to London was decided on and St Pancras Station opened on 1st October 1868. Remarkable expansion took place, the company being a forward looking concern often setting the trend; it was the first in England to introduce the luxury of Pullman travel in 1874 and feature restaurant cars on most of it's Express trains. It also had a vast freight traffic operation. The Midland was formed in 1844 by an amalgamation of the North Midland, Midland Counties and the Birmingham & Derby Railways. By using Joint Agreements it had services to all principal towns and cities and owned over 2,000 route miles.



MIDLAND & GREAT NORTHERN JOINT RAILWAYS

Jointly owned by the Midland and the Great Northern Railways. Formerly The Eastern & Midlands Railway, made up of the Peterborough, Wisbech & Sutton Bridge, Midland & Eastern, Lynn & Fakenham, Yarmouth Union and Yarmouth & North Norfolk Railways and titled the Eastern & Midlands from 1883. In 1893 the railway became the Midland and Great Northern Joint Railways and was worked as a separate concern as the `Midland & Great Northern Joint Committee'. The routes to Sheringham, Cromer, Yarmouth, Lowestoft, Norwich and the famous Norfolk Broads were always busy using the connecting services from London and the Midlands. The Committee were also co-owners with the Great Eastern Railway of the Norfolk & Suffolk Joint Railway with its two coast lines, one from Yarmouth to Lowestoft direct via Gorleston-onsea and the other from North Walsham to Cromer via Mundesley. The Committee were responsible for 183 route miles.



NORTH EASTERN RAILWAY

Extending through Yorkshire, Durham, Northumberland and into Westmoorland and Cumberland. The N.E.R. was amalgamated in 1863 with the Stockton & Darlington Railway which dated back to 1825. Incorporated in 1854 the North Eastern Railway was an amalgamation of the York, Newcastle & Berwick, the York & North Midland and Leeds Northern Railways. The Newcastle & Carlisle was added in 1862. The N.E.R. formed the middle link in the East Coast Main Line route. The Railway carried the largest tonnage of mineral and coal traffic of all the railways. They were also the largest dock owner in the Country. The Company owned 1,711 route miles and shared 36 miles.







RHYMNEY RAILWAY

Incorporated 1854 for construction of a line from Rhymney in the County of Glamorgan to a junction with the Newport, Abergavenny & Hereford Railway at Hengoed. The following year an Act was obtained to extend towards Cardiff to join the Taff Vale Railway at Wallnut Tree Bridge. The Act included powers to run from Rhymney to Cardiff Docks via a junction with the Newport, Abergavenny & Hereford Railway at Hengoed. In 1865 the Bargoed - Rhymney Branch was joined to the Brecon & Merthyr Railway allowing access to the mid Wales section of the Cambrian and the Midland Railways. Powers were also obtained to extend north to Nantybwch and join the L & NW Railways line giving access to the Welsh coalfields and industry. The Railway owned 38 route miles and ran 10 jointly.



SHEFFIELD AND MIDLAND RAILWAYS COMMITTEE

The Sheffield & Midland Railways Committee was jointly owned by the Great Central (formerly Manchester, Sheffield & Lincolnshire) and Midland Railway. The joint Company was formed in 1869 by the amalgamation of the Manchester & Stockport and the Marple, New Mills & Hayfield Junction railways. The lines extended for 28 miles between Hayfield via Birch Vale, Strines, Marple, Romiley, Bredbury and Reddish to Belle Vue and then over Great Central Railway tracks to Manchester, and from Sankey to Hough Green via Tanhouse Lane and Widness. The main line was owned by the Cheshire Lines Committee.

SHROPSHIRE & MONTGOMERYSHIRE RAILWAY

The Shropshire & Montgomeryshire Railway started life in 1866 as the Potteries, Shrewsbury & North Wales Railway, but closed in 1880 with financial difficulties. The original company had only built the section of line from Shrewsbury to Blodwell Junction near Nanthawr Quarry. Several schemes to re-open the line were proposed during its 20 year closure, the most notable in the early 1890's by the Shropshire Railway Company which was formed partly by Potteries shareholders in a last ditch attempt to retrieve some of their lost investments. Attempts to raise monies failed.

In 1910 the line was re-opened as the Shropshire & Montgomeryshire Railway by Colonel Stephens. During 1939 the Army took over some of the stations as supply dumps which it used until 1960. The line closed on 29 February 1960.



SOUTH EASTERN RAILWAY

The South Eastern included two of the oldest railways in the south of England; The London & Greenwich opened in 1837 and The Canterbury & Whitstable opened in 1830. The South Eastern Railway was incorporated in 1836. The first section to Tonbridge opened 1842. The extension from London Bridge Station to Cannon Street and Charing Cross Stations gave the railway a huge advantage over other lines, but the cost was high - four million pounds for two miles at 1865 prices. Eventually a direct line to Tonbridge via Sevenoaks was opened in 1868. In 1899 the South Eastern Railway amalgamated with the London Chatham & Dover Railway and took the title South Eastern & Chatham Railway



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
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SOUTHERN RAILWAY

The Southern Region was formed by the 1923 amalgamation and was the smallest of the railways, but actually carrying more passengers than the others. The S.R. was made up from the following companies; the London & South Western, the London, Brighton & South Coast, South Eastern & Chatham, and smaller lines including the Isle of Wight, the Isle of Wight Central, the Lynton & Barnstaple and the Freshwater, Yarmouth & Newport Railway.





STRATFORD-ON-AVON & MIDLAND JUNCTION RAILWAY

Known as 'The Shakespeare Route', was formed by the amalgamation of the East & West Junction, Evesham, Redditch & Stratford upon Avon Junction and the Towcester & Midland Junction Railways. It purchased the Northampton & Banbury Junction Railway originally designed to develop iron ore traffic and form a shorter route from Northamptonshire into South Wales. The line also provided an important route between London and the west of England connecting with the Midland Railway at Ravenstone Wood junction and Broom junction. Extending via Towcester and Stratford the line joins the London, Bedford, Northampton, Birmingham and Bristol lines, it also connected with the Great Central at Woodford and Hinton. The railway was connected to the London & North Western at Blisworth, and with the Great Western Railway at Stratford and Fenny Compton. The route mileage was 67.




TAFF VALE RAILWAY

One of the oldest railways in Wales, it was incorporated as early as 21st June 1836 for a line between Merthyr Tydfil and Cardiff Docks. Opened to passenger traffic in 1840. The following railways became amalgamated with the T.V.R. - Cowbridge 1899, Dare Valley 1889, Llantrisant & Taff Vale Junction 1889, Treferig Valley 1889 and Aberdare 1902. In addition the Penarth Harbour Dock and Railway and the Penarth Extension were leased. For many years the Railway paid one of the best dividends of any railway. The route mileage was 112.



WIRRAL RAILWAY

The origins of Wirral Railway date back to 1863 when the Hoylake Railway Company was incorporated with powers to build a railway from Birkenhead to Poulton - cum -Seacombe and Hoylake. In 1865/6 a line was built from New Brighton to Parkgate. In 1872 the Hoylake & Birkenhead Rail Tramway was incorporated. Powers were obtained in 1873 to extend to West Kirby with connections from Birkenhead docks to the dock railways of the Mersey Dock & Harbour Board. Powers were obtained in 1881 to extend to Seacombe and change the name to the Seacombe, Hoylake and Deeside Railway Company. An extension to New Brighton was authorised in 1882. 



CITY OF GLASGOW UNION RAILWAY





GREAT NORTH OF SCOTLAND RAILWAY

Incorporated in 1846 for a railway from Aberdeen to Inverness with various branches, originally it was intended to amalgamate with the Aberdeen Railway but the act was repealed in 1850, and the Aberdeen became part of the Caledonian in 1866. The first section from Kittybrewster to Huntly opened in 1854. In 1866 the system was consolidated by the absorption of the Alford Valley, Formatine & Buchan, Inverurie & Old Meldrum, Aberdeen & Turrif, The Banff, Macduff & Turriff Extension, the Keith & Dufftown and the Strathspey railways. In 1875 the Deeside Railway serving Ballater, Balmoral and Braemar was added. Later lines were opened to Ellon, Cruden Bay and Boddam with a light railway from Fraserburgh to St Combs. The company owned 334 route miles.





THE HIGHLAND RAILWAY COMPANY

The Highland Railway originated with the Inverness and Nairn Railway which opened for traffic on 5th November 1855. Another Railway from Nairn to Keith was opened in 1858 and amalgamated with the former in under the name of The Inverness & Aberdeen Railway. Inverness & Perth Junction Railway, diverging from the Inverness & Aberdeen Railway via a junction at Forres and joining the Perth & Dunkeld Railway at Dunkeld was opened in 1863. These railways were all united under the name `The Highland Railway ' in 1865. The Ross-Shire Railway from Inverness to Invergordon opened in 1863, extended to Bonar Bridge in 1864. The Sutherland Railway from Bonar Bridge to Golspie was opened in 1870. The Duke of Sutherland constructed a line from Golspie to Helmsdale in 1871, and the final stage to Wick and Thurso was opened in 1874. These lines were merged into The Highland Railway in 1884. In 1898 a more direct route South from Inverness to Aviemore was opened. The Railway owned 484 route miles and ran 21 jointly.

DONEGAL RAILWAY COMPANY

The Donegal Railway was an amalgamation of the Finn Valley and West Donegal Railways. Incorporated under its new title during October 1892. The Finn Valley Railway ran from Stranorlar through Killygordon, Liscooly, Castlefinn and Clady to Strabane and was incorporated in 1860, opening three years later. The West Donegal line ran in the opposite direction from Stranorlar through Meen Glas and Lough Eske to Donegal, opening during 1889. Subsequently the line was extended westward from Donegal to Inver and Killibegs in 1893 and northward from Strabane to Londonderry in 1899. A branch from Stranorlar to Fintown and Glenties opened during 1895. Subsequent amalgamations and extensions left the County Donegal Railways Joint working over 125 miles of line - then the longest narrow gauge system in the United Kingdom.





GREAT NORTHERN RAILWAY (IRELAND)

The company was an amalgamation of some of the oldest railways in Ireland, namely the Ulster, Dublin and Drogheda and four others. The final amalgamation was in 1876. The track gauge was an unusual six foot two inches, later changed to the Standard Irish five foot three inches. The main line ran from Dublin (Amiens Street) to Belfast via Malahide, Drogheda, Dundalk, and Portadown.

Lines from Dundalk to Londonderry via Clones, Enniskillen, Omagh and Strabane and from Portadown to Clones via Armagh and Monaghan, and to Omagh via Dungannon, served many of the more important towns. Other branches ran to Oldcastle, Howth, Newry, Warrenpoint, Antrim etc. By 1930 the Railway owned 561 route miles shared worked or leased a further 45 miles.
