The head of Tatius, king of the Sabines, refers to the claim of the moneyer's family to Sabine origin. The *TA* monogram identifies Tatius and the *SC* is an abbreviation of *Senatus Consulto* (issued by authority of the Senate).

**Reverse:** Magistrate in slow biga holding staff, ear of corn behind, *IVDEX* above, *T. VETTIVS* in exergue

The word *IVDEX* (judge or juror) on the reverse may refer to the passage of *Lex Aurelia iudiciaria* in 70 BC which provided that juries should be chosen from senators, equites and *tribuni aerarrii*. The imagery may also be a portrayal of a magistrate engaged in judicial activity, perhaps the distribution of corn.
